### ***WILLIAM PALMER***



William Palmer, 86, passed away at his home on Main Road in Carmel on October 4, 2018. He moved to Carmel with his family at age 5 from Downeast Maine and he never considered living anywhere else. Carmel became part of who he was. He attended Carmel schools and played on their sports teams where he was lauded as a standout basketball player. After graduating from high school, he volunteered to serve in the Korean War. He was part of the military honor guard for Dwight D. Eisenhower's inauguration and he distinguished himself during the Battle of Pork Chop Hill. While leading his men in an assault against the enemy, he was wounded. (He carried shrapnel for the rest of his life.) Refusing evacuation, then Corporal Palmer deployed his men into defensive positions from which they were able to hold the ground they had taken. When a member of his squad was wounded, he crawled through enemy fire and dragged the casualty to safety. He was awarded both the Bronze Star and the Purple Heart.

Bill returned home to Carmel and married Jannette Nichols, his wife of 62 years. He joined Phoenix Mutual Life Insurance Company and enjoyed a distinguished career in the insurance business. Bill and Jannette had four children, Bill, Scott, Shelley, and Greg, raising them within sight of the home where he, himself was raised. Bill gave back to his hometown as a Selectman, Moderator at annual town meetings, and countless other ways. He was considered an honest, hardworking man and a positive influence on his community, which gave back to him. He was proud to tell people where he was from and believed the best things in life are local.

The family would like to thank everyone who visited Bill during his illness and who attended the get together to remember him at the Grange Hall.

Dear Friends:

It was the highest honor of my life to take the oath of office to become Maine's 75th governor. Over the next four years, I will do everything in my power to make Maine the safe, beautiful, prosperous state we all want for our children and grandchildren.

That is why on my first day in office I directed the Maine Department of Health and Human Services to implement Medicaid expansion as quickly and efficiently as possible. We will also develop a world-class workforce starting with Pre-K for every 4-year-old in Maine and more post-high school options that result in a valued credential. Attracting talented young people to move here and make Maine their home will be top priorities of my Administration.

Maine communities, especially rural communities, are confronting a severe workforce shortage and an aging and declining population. It is time for bold, dynamic ideas that will change Maine for the better. That is why I, along with people ranging from small business owners, innovators and entrepreneurs, to economists and every day, hard-working Mainer, developed an economic plan designed to make it easier for small businesses to grow, for people to come and stay, and for Maine to thrive.

I welcome your ideas. We are all in this together. We all want Maine to have a beautiful environment, happy people, and prosperous communities

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## UNITED STATES SENATOR

Dear Friends,

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our state have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments from this past year.

As Chairman of the Senate Aging Committee, I worked to help ensure the well-being of our seniors. The *SeniorSafe Act* I authored became law last year and is empowering banks, credit unions, and other financial institutions to better protect seniors from financial fraud.

Following extensive committee investigations of prescription drug pricing, additional legislation I crafted became law, ending the egregious practice of pharmacy “gag clauses” that prevented pharmacists from informing patients on how to pay the lowest possible price.

This year, I was also successful in securing an extra \$425 million for Alzheimer’s research—the largest funding increase ever—bringing the total to \$2.34 billion. Additionally, the bipartisan *BOLD Act* I authored will create public health infrastructure to combat Alzheimer’s by promoting education, early diagnosis, and improved care management.

More than 40 million Americans—including 178,000 Mainers—are caregivers for parents, spouses, children, and other loved ones with disabilities or illnesses, such as Alzheimer’s. The *RAISE Family Caregivers Act* I authored was signed into law last year, giving caregivers more resources and training to better balance the full-time job of caregiving. Another law I wrote will help grandparents who are raising grandchildren, largely due to the opioid addiction crisis.

In addition to helping seniors, a major accomplishment over the past year is the increased federal investment in biomedical research that is leading to progress in the fight against numerous devastating diseases. Congress has boosted funding for the National Institutes of Health by \$7 billion in just the last three years, bringing total funding to more than \$39 billion.

One of my highest priorities as Chairman of the Transportation Appropriations Subcommittee is to improve our nation’s crumbling infrastructure and ensure that Maine’s needs are addressed. Since the Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage Development (BUILD) Transportation Grants program, formerly known as TIGER, was established in 2009, I have secured \$160 million for vital transportation projects throughout Maine.

Congress also delivered a Farm Bill last year, which includes many important provisions that will help the agriculture industry in Maine and across the country. Specifically, I secured provisions that will strengthen support for young farmers, improve local farm-to-market efforts, and increase funding for organic research.

Congress took decisive action to address the opioid addiction epidemic. In addition to appropriating \$8.5 billion in federal funding last year, Congress enacted the *SUPPORT for Patients and Communities Act*, a comprehensive package that embraces the multipronged approach I have long advocated for this epidemic: prevention, treatment, recovery, and enforcement to stop drug trafficking.

Maine plays a key role in ensuring a strong national defense. In 2018, Congress provided funding for five ships to be built at Bath Iron Works, which will help to keep our nation safe and provide our skilled shipbuilders a steady job. I also secured more than \$162 million for infrastructure projects at Portsmouth Naval Shipyard to support their important work to overhaul Navy submarines.

A Maine value that always guides me is our unsurpassed work ethic. In December 2018, I cast my 6,834<sup>th</sup> consecutive vote, continuing my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997.

Dear Friends,

As I travel Maine, I hear from people who live in every corner of our state. I hear about their achievements, their successes, their work to improve their communities – I hear about the hope they have for our state. I also hear about our challenges, and all the work we have left to do. As I see it, that’s my job: to listen to you, act where I can to build on what’s good, and work on the tough parts. As 2018 comes to a close, I wanted to take a moment to share an update on some of the work we’re doing in Washington to lift up the accomplishments of Maine people and make progress on the challenges they face.

From Portland to Presque Isle, from Milo to Camden, I hear about the pain that the opioid epidemic is inflicting on Maine communities. I’ve met with Maine people in recovery, family members of those struggling with substance use disorders, treatment providers, and law enforcement officials to learn about their experiences with this terrible disease, and everyone agrees that in order to fully respond to these problems, we need a stronger federal effort to end the opioid epidemic. Fortunately, some help is on the way – in October, we overwhelmingly passed a sweeping, bipartisan opioids bill. I’ve pushed hard for this type of legislation and was proud to have provisions I’ve advocated for included in the bill. These priorities have been guided by the voices of Maine people, and we’ll keep working to confront this tragic problem.

I’ve also worked to strengthen the future of our forest economy. Maine’s forests have powered our state’s economy for generations, especially in our rural communities. So, when rapid shifts in the market led to the closure of many pulp and paper mills and biomass power plants, it required a collaborative approach to support future growth in this important industry. That’s why, together with the other members of the state’s Congressional delegation, I pushed to establish the Economic Development Assessment Team (EDAT). This integrated, multiagency effort aims to foster innovation and commercialization in Maine’s forest economy, and we’re already seeing the benefits: in recent months, several forest industry businesses have announced significant investments into Maine operations, and in September 2018, the Forest Opportunity Roadmap (FOR)/Maine released an action plan to make sure this industry, and the rural communities it supports, can continue to thrive for generations to come.

As I close this letter, please allow me to express my gratitude to each of you – for your dedication to our state, and to one another. It’s often said that Maine is like a big small town (with very long streets)—that’s because at our heart, we’re one big community. It’s not only a pleasure to serve you— it’s a pleasure to know you. Thank you for being the reason Maine is so special. Mary and I hope that 2019 will be a good year for you, your family, your community, and our great State.

Dear Friends and Neighbors:

Let me start by thanking you for the honor to serve you in the Maine Senate. For the past eight years, I have served in the House of Representatives serving three communities in Penobscot County. In the Senate, I now represent fifteen communities in Penobscot County. I know I am a new face to many and I look forward to getting to know your community during my term in the Senate.

Following the November elections, the newly elected 129<sup>th</sup> Legislature was sworn-in on December 5, 2018. One of the very first acts of this Legislature will be presiding over the inauguration of the incoming governor, Governor Janet Mills. The Mills Administration will inherit a strong Maine economy with record low unemployment and a state budget that has had surpluses instead of shortfalls. Many Mainers will remember that our economy was not in good shape just a few short years ago. However, after years of sound fiscal management, like paying off Maine's \$500 million owed to our hospitals, our state is in a much stronger position financially. Maintaining strong fiscal policies will be a top priority of mine.

The opioid epidemic continues to devastate our state and communities. Drug addiction affects Mainers from every walk of life: young to old, urban to rural, affluent to poor. Finding solutions that help quell the flow of these poisons into our state will be a priority for me. It is important that the Legislature support treatment programs that have proven results for Maine families. We must also find ways to increase awareness and prevention to stop the damage before it starts.

Many decisions for the first six months of this Legislature will surround the makeup of the next two-year budget. Maine is required to pass a balanced budget; the current budget expires on July 1<sup>st</sup>. The current budget gave an historic increase in funding to K-12 education. Maintaining the current level of funding should be the goal of legislators. Any decrease in funding will result in an increased burden on the local municipalities in the form of property tax increases.



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## TOWN MANAGER REPORT

As I look back over the past few years, there is a common theme that has become clear to me. The heart of this rural community is its residents. You are the ones who make this town what it is. The pursuit of common goals defines a town like Carmel. The growth and success of our annual Carmel Days Festival and Parade along with the 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Trunk or Treat event is evidence to this fact. The future of these events and others to come is close to my heart and I thank you all for supporting and participating as you have and I look forward to doing my part in making sure we continue to improve year after year.

After a long planning process, the construction on the Town Landing started once the grant to fund the project was approved this past summer. The final construction phase will take place once snow melts and the water levels subside, which will then lead to preparations for a grand opening in the summer of this year.

You will see article 25 of this year's Town Meeting Warrant is asking for authority to appropriate \$20,000.00 from surplus to renovate the town-owned garage located in the village on route 2 behind Rick's Mini Mart. This building is the original Fire Station and is in desperate need of a complete makeover including doors, windows, siding and roof. As the recreation department grows and we expand our community events, there is a need for additional storage. The location of this building is ideal for convenient access by all the municipal departments that will find value in its use.

As you read this report, you will see a breakdown of how the approved budget was expended in 2018 and what is proposed for 2019. I would like to point out that the budgets that were passed in 2017 & 2018 resulted in a REDUCTION in the amount being raised from new taxes for the municipal share. This year is no different as the municipal burden on our tax commitment will be lower than it has been since 2012. The Town has a healthy general fund and if the Governor's proposed budget survives legislature, we could see restored state revenue sharing and increased school funding which will contribute even more towards lessening the tax burden on local real estate.

There were significant changes in 2018 as to how the ambulance is staffed. Please read Chief Shaw's report to learn about what actions were taken to enhance the ambulance service and other updates to the Fire and Rescue Department.

Meanwhile, we were busy keeping the town running efficiently with all the departments doing their part to serve you and provide the services you need and expect. I am fortunate to have the dedicated staff you have all grown to know. The public works crew continues to get the job done year after year with the maintenance of the roads, bridges, cemeteries, recreation complex, town office and anything else they are called on to handle.

I would like to thank the Planning Board and Budget Committee for their service. A special thank you to each one of the members of the Fire and Ambulance Service for everything they do to make our town a safer place to live. The Recreation Department under the leadership of Deidra McIntosh continues to provide new and enhanced activities for everyone to enjoy.

Above all, I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen for their support and giving me the opportunity to serve the residents of this fine town. It is a privilege and a pleasure to come to work every day in this capacity and I look forward to serving you all for many years to come.

## CARMEL FIRE & RESCUE

I would like to thank the men and women of the Carmel Fire & Rescue department, who continue to serve their community above and beyond the needs of their own families. I would like to especially thank the families that allow the Firefighters and Emergency Medical Technicians to leave for calls.

There have been many changes to the department over the past year. Chief Ryan Simpson resigned as Fire Chief in May of 2018 and I was asked to be the interim Fire Chief. In January of 2019 I was sworn in as Fire & Rescue Chief. I live in Hampden just a mile from the Carmel town line. I have been an Assistant Fire Chief for twelve years, 7 years in Plymouth and 5 in Carmel. I have been a Fire Chief for seven years, 5 years in Plymouth and 2 as the Fire Chief of Newburg. I have been an EMT for the 23 years, working in Carmel for the last 9.

In May of 2018, the fire department turned in a new direction. I began to ask members who had left the department to return and help with staffing and training. William Crowley, Michael Azevedo, and Robbin Lanpher answered my call to return. We began working with our mutual aid partners to bring training opportunities to this department. We just completed a promotional process and promoted Steven Cyr, Aaron Brown, Edward Moulton, and Keith Rogers to the position of Lieutenants.

In 2018 we made some big changes to the way the ambulance is staffed. Instead of hiring another full-time Firefighter/EMT, we entered into a contract with Northern Light Medical to cover the station Monday – Thursday from 8 a.m. until 6 p.m. The ambulance is licensed to the paramedic level, so that any level of provider may cover the shift. Fire department members are paid a stipend to cover the driving position. On Fridays, we try to staff the ambulance with our own EMS providers.

In July, Northern Light will staff the ambulance on Fridays, and we will move in the direction of staffing on the weekends. Most of the calls that Carmel responds to are during the daylight hours, so this works out well for the town. This staffing agreement allows the ambulance to respond to Carmel as well as the towns of Etna, Dixmont, and Newburgh. The additional funding allows the ambulance to pay for itself, while allowing us to partially fund the driving position.

Northern Light Medical Transport sends another ambulance to standby in the area when the ambulance is out of town. They will provide an ambulance for us to use when ours is being repaired, and they provide medical training for our providers. This is truly a win-win situation for the Town of Carmel.

Carmel Fire & Rescue responded to 414 incidents in 2018. The call volume breakdown is listed below.

I would like to thank the citizens of Carmel. Your continued support of this department allows us to continue serving you with excellent equipment, better training and new ideas leading us into the future.

## ROAD COMMISSIONER

2018 was another productive year. We were able to completely re-design, engineer and construct the area under the Five Road railroad bridge which I am sure was a relief for daily travelers on that road. That project was done in preparation of a complete reclaim and repaving of the entire section of the Five Road from Fuller Road to Route 2. Several other sections of road were repaved including the Cook Road and Fuller Road, along with a final surface on Beaver Creek and large patching on the Horseback Road. Significant ditching was performed on the upper Five Road and many other ditches were cleaned and failing culverts replaced. We continue to learn new ways to be more efficient in completing annual maintenance tasks.

Two years ago, we made a change to our roadside mowing program. Instead of renting an expensive tractor and having our crew log many hours of overtime, we contracted the job out to a local company and were able to get the road sides mowed twice, once in the summer and again in the fall, for less than what one mowing cost in previous years. This coming year, I am hoping to coordinate with MDOT so that the state roads are mowed at the same time and with the same quality as our local roads.

In 2018 the Public Works Department took over the mowing and maintenance of the recreation complex. This has saved a significant amount of money for the town and although it is a tremendous amount of work, it is well within the capacity of our seasonal crew.


Route 69 is a sour subject for everyone. As you know, the maintenance of the pavement and drainage is the responsibility of the state. After much deliberation, they conceded and agreed to apply a shim to the worst areas of that highway last summer. They have committed to ditching and culvert work in 2019 and repaving the entire stretch of highway in 2020.

I look forward to continuing to work on improving the town roads and facilities for many years to come. We will continue to find ways to do things better and at the most sensible cost while maintaining the ultimate goal of providing safe and comfortable roads for everyone.

## CODE ENFORCEMENT

As I enter my fifth year as your CEO, I can't express enough how much I enjoy meeting new residents throughout the year as they stop in to apply for various permits or inquire into land use rules. Each year, there are more and more requests for permits and land subdivision. New construction is booming throughout the region and it was realized here in Carmel with construction on 19 new homes started.

The Office of Code Enforcement handles the issuance of all permits, including building, plumbing (both interior and exterior) as well as junkyard permits and special use permits. I also perform occupancy inspections on all new homes and plumbing inspections on all new interior and exterior installations. Other duties of the office include answering all land use and ordinance questions, working with the Planning Board on all subdivision and special use permit applications, and enforcement of the Land Use and Shoreland Zoning Ordinances.

I also look at buildings that could be considered dangerous and a public safety hazard.

It is important to obtain the proper permits before starting any project. If you are planning any type of building, even a small shed or addition, please contact me in advance. ## PLANNING BOARD

Fellow Residents of Carmel

This past year the Planning Board reviewed the Town's Comprehensive Plan. A review of this plan should be recommended every five years. This allows us to make sure the guidelines of this plan are being followed and to see if revisions are needed.

The Planning Board approved two special use permits, one for an animal acupuncture/physical therapy clinic. The other for a vehicle installation and repair of electronic equipment, such as back up cameras, remote starters and radios.

One sub-division was approved, allowing nine new homes to be built on the Irish road. As we reviewed the ordinances, we are recommending changes to allow 150' foot road frontage on house lots in sub-divisions, this would still require two acres of land. At this time the commercial zone located along Rt. 2 only extends five hundred feet deep from the center of the road, we are recommending this be expanded to 1,000'.

I would like to give a special thanks to the Planning Board and Town Manager/CEO Kevin Howell for all your time and commitments to the Town of Carmel



Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Carmel, in said County and State, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Town Office Fire Station, in said Town on Saturday, the 2<sup>nd</sup> day of March, A.D. 2019, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon Article I, and by written ballot on Article 2 as set out below, the polling hours therefore to be from ten o'clock in the forenoon until four o'clock in the afternoon;

And to notify and warn said inhabitants to meet at the Carmel Elementary School Gymnasium in said Town on Monday, the 4<sup>th</sup> day of March 2019 A.D., at seven o'clock in the evening, then and there to act on Articles 3 through 32 as set out below, to wit:

ARTICLE 1. To elect a moderator to preside at said meeting and to vote by written ballot.

ARTICLE 2. To elect by ballot all necessary officers for the ensuing year, to wit: two Selectmen for three years and one Director for RSU 87 for three years.

ARTICLE 3. To choose, by ballot, three (3) members of the Budget Committee for three years.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to fix a date when taxes shall be due and payable, and to set a rate of interest to be paid after that date. Recommend 30 days from date of billing and **9.00%** per year.


## BOSTON POST CANE

In August 2018, the Boston Post Cane was awarded to Althea Nute in a ceremony at her home with family. Althea is the oldest citizen of Carmel at 96 years young! Julia Pike helped with the presentation and two of our Selectmen, John Luce and Jared Fitts were present to congratulate Althea.

THE BOSTON POST CANE: Make sure to take a look at the Boston Post Cane on display at the Town Office the next time you visit. Back in 1909, the Boston Post held an unusual publicity stunt. They sent canes made of ebony and capped with gold to 700 small New England towns with instructions that they be given to the oldest citizen of that town and passed on after their death. The Boston Post folded in 1956, but the cane tradition has continued.
