

SCHOOL, NO. 1.

This school was taught by Miss Lucy Leeman. Wages per week \$6.00.

SCHOOL, NO. 2.

Pupils conveyed to village school by A. A. Call. Cost per week \$4.00.

SCHOOL NO. 3, (GRAMMAR.)

Was taught by Miss Harriett Lyford. Wages per week \$9.00.

SCHOOL NO. 3, (PRIMARY.)

Was taught by Miss Georgia Chipman. Wages per week \$7.50.

SCHOOL NO. 4.

This school was taught by Miss Kate Lyford. Wages per week \$6.50.

SCHOOL NO. 5.

Was taught by Miss Sara Whitney. Wages paid \$6.50.

SCHOOL NO. 6.

This school was taught by Mrs. Estella Hughes. Wages paid per week \$8.00.

Owing to the ill-feeling shown toward Mrs. Hughes by some of the parents in this district, Mrs. Hughes resigned at the end of the seventh week.

SCHOOL NO. 7.

Was taught by Miss Laura Ring. Wages per week \$7.00.

SCHOOL NO. 8.

Was taught by Miss Nellie O'Neil. Wages per week \$6.00.

SCHOOL NO. 9.

This school was taught by Miss Lizzie Jones. Wages per week \$7.00.

SCHOOL NO. 10.

Was taught by Mrs. Ada Morton. Wages per week \$7.00.

BERTHA K. WHITE,

Supt. of Schools for Spring term.

Upon the resignation of Mrs. White July 26th, 1908, I was chosen to succeed her. I submit the following as my report of schools for Fall and Winter term.

SCHOOL NO. 1.

Taught by Miss Lillian Miller. No. of scholars registered 7; average 6. Length of term 13 weeks; wages per week \$6.00. Miss Miller is one of our best teachers.

Scholars from old district No. 2 conveyed to village district by E. L. Leonard. Cost for 13 weeks \$52.

SCHOOL NO. 3, (GRAMMAR.)

Taught by Mrs. Edna E. Burrill. No. of scholars registered, 24; average attendance, 20; wages \$8.00 per week.

Although there was some dissatisfaction expressed in the district, yet on the whole I considered it a very fair school.

SCHOOL NO. 3, (PRIMARY.)

This school was taught by Miss Georgia Chipman, who is one of our very best teachers.

Under her instruction the pupils made good advancement, and it was a very satisfactory school.

No. of scholars registered, 25; average, 21; wages per week, \$7.50.

SCHOOL NO. 4.

Taught by Edwin S. Andrews. No. of scholars registered, 7; average attendance, 6; wages \$6.00 per week.

While Mr. Andrews did well by the larger scholars I do not think he did his full duty by some of the smaller ones.

SCHOOL NO. 5.

Taught by Miss Sara Whitney of Kenduskeag.

Miss Whitney has much ability as a teacher and gave good satisfaction both to the Superintendent and district. No. scholars registered, 18; average, 15; wages per week, \$6.50.

SCHOOL NO. 6.

This school was under the instruction of Miss Vina Lennan, of Stetson.

Length of term, 13 weeks; wages \$8.00 per week; No. of scholars registered, 29; average, 25.

Miss Lennan is an experienced teacher and understands the business of teaching school. She gave good satisfaction.

SCHOOL NO. 7.

Taught by Miss Lucy Leeman. Miss Leeman is one of our younger teachers and bids fair to make one of the best. She taught a good school.

No. of scholars registered, 15; general average, 12; wages paid, \$6.00 per week.

SCHOOL No. 8.

This school was taught by Miss Nellie M. O'Neil. Length of term, 13 weeks; wages paid \$6.00 per week; No. of scholars registered, 14; average attendance for the term, 10.

There are some smart scholars in this school and all showed a good interest in their studies.

SCHOOL NO. 9.

The first six weeks of fall term was taught by Miss Angie Prescott of Newburgh. Wages, \$7.00 per week; No. of scholars registered, 22; average attendance, 18.

Owing to ill-health and some trouble among a few of the scholars out of school hours, and for which after investigating, did not consider her to blame, Miss Prescott did not wish to finish the school, although she was giving good satisfaction. The remainder of the term, 7 weeks, was taught by Mr. Harry McLaughlin. Wages, \$8.00 per week; No. of scholars registered, 17; average, 14.

Mr. McLaughlin is a good teacher and has a happy faculty in his manner of imparting instruction to his pupils.

SCHOOL NO. 10.

Taught by Mrs. Ada Morton. No. of scholars registered, 17; average, 15. Length of term, 13 weeks; wages, \$8.00 per week.

I cannot speak too highly of Mrs. Morton as a teacher; the pupils made rapid advancement under her instruction. She gave complete satisfaction in every way.

Whole number of persons of school age in town April 1, 1908, 249.

There is now in session at Carmel village a Precinct High School, the funds for which were raised by donations from the people of the precinct.

This school is under the instruction of Mrs. Ada Morton and is well attended. It bids fair to be a very successful term.

We are fairly well supplied with text books with the exception of our readers which are nearly worn out and ought to be exchanged. I can hardly see how we can get along without new readers another year. The algebras we are using are very blind

and I do not blame the pupils for wanting something different. I would like to see them replaced for some that are more up to date, like the Wentworth's. We have hardly enough books of any kind to go around and I was greatly handicapped for lack of funds with which to purchase more, for after the old school book bill of 1906 was paid by Mrs. White and deducting the amount overdrawn in 1907 there was left the very liberal sum of \$27.42 with which to purchase books for the entire year.

It will require \$250 to purchase the books needed the coming year and to pay the balance due for books purchased in 1908. I would urge upon the voters the necessity of raising a sum of money for schools sufficient to have at least three terms of eight weeks each in the year. As a rule the wages we pay teachers are small and it is somewhat difficult to get good teachers at the prices we can pay.

In closing I will suggest that the parents visit the schools and see for themselves what is being done.

Become a personal friend of the teacher. Uphold her in all good endeavors and let her feel that you appreciate her work whenever she has done well. I think teachers often become discouraged and think it is not much use to try to please. Again let me urge the parents to visit the schools and with the intention of helping them all they can. If they will do so I think they will find that as a rule we have very good schools.
