# WARRANT

*To S. B. Loring, Constable of Carmel in said County,*

## GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Carmel, qualified by law to vote in said town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said town on Monday, the 7th day of March, A. D. 1932, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To elect a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To elect a Town Clerk.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the reports of the municipal officers as printed.

Art. 4. To elect three or more Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor.

Art. 5. To elect a Town Treasurer.

Art. 6. To elect one or more members of the Superintending School Committee.

Art. 7. To elect a Collector of Taxes and fix his compensation for same.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to elect a Road Commissioner or authorize the Selectmen to act as Road Commissioners.

Art. 9. To elect one or more Road Commissioners if the town so votes in the preceeding article.

Art. 10. To elect a Fire Warden, Sextons, Surveyors of Wood, Lumber and Bark; Fence Viewers, Pound Keeper, Tramp Constable, Town Agent and Health Officer.

Art. 11. To fix the compensation of each of our several officers: First Selectman, Second Selectman, Third Selectman, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, Town Treasurer, Road Commissioner, Superintending School Committee, Fire Warden and raise money for the same.

Art. 12. To elect one or more Town Constables.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the following purposes:

For Roads, Bridges and Sidewalks—Summer

For Snow Fence.

For Common Schools.

For High School.

For School Books Account.

For School Contingent.

For Schoolhouse Repairs—Common.

For New Building in the Village.

For High School Apparatus and Supplies.

For Salary of Superintendent.

For Interest on Common School Fund.

For Interest on Loan of New School Building.

For Notes Due 1932 on New School Building.

For Support of Poor.

For Cutting Bushes on the State Aid, State Highway and Third Class Roads.

For Memorial Day Exercises.

For Care of Cemeteries.

For Contingent Account.

For Street Lights.

For Mothers' Aid.

For Simpson's Memorial Library.

Art. 14. To see what action the town will take in regard to the removal of snow the coming winter, and raise money for the same.

Art. 15. To see if the town will raise the sum of \$375.00 to pay for snow plow, voted at special town meeting, and vote to buy another and raise money for the same.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the improvement of section of State aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916, or Chapter 258 P. L. 1917.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise money and what sum for the maintenance of State Highway, State Aid Highway within the limits of said town under Sections 8 and 17, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will raise for Special Resolve Maintenance under Chapter 124, P. L. 1927.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to raise \$506.00 for the maintenance of third class roads, in order for the town to be entitled to third class apportionment, under the provisions of Section 4, Chapter 260, P. L. 1927.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to raise money to provide for the services of a County Health Nurse, and how much.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to reimburse Edith Storer whole or part tax on buildings destroyed by fire in 1930.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 to be expended on the Full road and Five road, so-called, beginning at the so-called John Hughes place, extending to State highway in village, for the purpose of ditching.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will raise to co-operate with the Maine Forest Service and Federal Government in the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

Art. 25. To see what action the town will take in regard to retaining the old overhead bridge.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to accept the following list of jurors as revised by the Selectmen and Town Clerk: W. A. Mowatt, C. E. Robinson, R. H. Day, Mrs. Hester McGown, C. H. McLaughlin, W. E. Patten, A. R. Stevens, Mrs. Edna S. Hewes, P. A. Haskell, A. H. Powell, R. F. Pendleton, J. B. Hand, Mrs. Katherine Haskell, Guy M. Lewis, G. F. Smith, E. L. Lamb, H. R. French, E. F. Robinson, H. M. Kelley.

Art. 27. To see what action the town will take in regard to the upkeep and maintenance of the road leading from the State Highway to the residence of C. E. Harvey.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to buy the (1500 ft.) of snow fence rented from the State, and used on State Highway.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer to issue a note or notes not in excess of \$3,200.00, to pay the balance of the temporary loan at the Merrill Trust Company, incurred during the year 1931 as evidence by certain tax anticipation notes due March 6th, 1932, said new notes to mature during said 1932 tax year.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to raise \$3,200.00 to pay the notes referred to in the preceding article.

Art. 31. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow from the Merrill Trust Company of Bangor, Maine, as a temporary loan or loans to and for the use of the Town of Carmel, in anticipation of the taxes of the current municipal year of 1932, sums of money in the aggregate not exceeding eight thousand dollars, (\$8,000.00) and authorize the Treasurer of the town to execute the negotiable note or notes of the town therefor, payable within said municipal year from moneys raised by taxation therein and upon such terms as shall be satisfactory to said Treasurer and the Selectmen of said town.

Art. 32. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting and raise money for the same.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the Town Hall in said town at nine thirty o'clock in the forenoon of said meeting.

*To the S. S. Committee and Citizens of Carmel:*

I hereby submit the annual report of the School Department.

## TEACHERS

It was decided at the beginning of the fall term to hire Miss Idona Cole as principal of the grammar grades. Miss Cole has proved efficient and has worked hard for the best interests of the school. One other change was made in the teaching staff, Mr. Elden Crosby having been elected at the Horseback school. Mr. Crosby has given excellent satisfaction. The other teachers, all of whom are known to you, have worked conscientiously and I feel that there has been fine progress in this department this year.

## HIGH SCHOOL

The principal's report will cover the history of the year at the high school. The increased registration speaks well for the standards of the school. Principal Erskine and Miss Oliver have endeavored to improve discipline and instruction, with a marked degree of success.

Some of the students should be encouraged by the parents to do more home work. We are striving to raise our standards of scholarship, and the co-operation of parents is necessary to bring about best results.

## REPAIRS

More repairs were found necessary this year than we estimated, accounting for the overdraft in this account.

The blackboards were painted, floors oiled, glass replaced and locks repaired in the four rural schoolhouses. Some work was done on the shed at Hinckley Hill, and the chimney re-topped at the Horseback school.

The schoolhouses now are all in fairly good condition, except for Damascus, which must be shingled this year.

#### NEW BUILDING

The greatest need at the new building is the partition or folding doors between the grammar and intermediate rooms.

The heating, ventilating and plumbing systems were completed this fall, making a thoroughly modern, comfortable and sanitary building, and distinctly an asset to the town.

We have had a record enrollment this year as the above figures clearly indicate. I find upon inquiry from reliable sources that Carmel High School has enjoyed a steady, healthy, growth since its first year.

Although handicapped in some ways, the results, in general, have been most encouraging, I am glad to state.

Conditions for studying due to cramped or crowded quarters have not been ideal, but by careful vigilance on the part of teachers, a studious atmosphere has been maintained. Some pupils might profit greatly if more time was spent in home study.

Encourage your children to plan for further training in

order that they may fit themselves well for agriculture, trade or a profession and thus make the greatest possible use of their high school education.

Any ambitious, healthy boy or girl who wants further training, not necessarily college training, but possibly training in some trade or form of skilled labor, can get it almost entirely by their own efforts, if necessary. The home may also co-operate to great advantage with the school in teaching proper care of public buildings and equipment.

The attendance has been very good for the most part, and many students have been on the Honor Roll at the end of each quarter.

The outside activities have been very successful. Students participating in outside activities have acquitted themselves well, in general, and almost without exception each affair has been a financial success. At this time, I wish to thank all who have so generously patronized our school affairs. We now have a balance of \$3.00 in our association treasury with no outstanding bills.

I have found the pupils a very fine group of young people and I have thoroughly enjoyed working with them.

Miss Oliver has been a fine co-worker, always very willing to perform any service for the good of the pupils and the school.

There has been excellent co-operation between parents and teachers. We appreciate this very much.

The School Board and Superintendent have been untiring in their efforts for the advancement of the school and we are very appreciative of their many favors.

In closing, I wish to thank all the parents and friends of the school, the School Board and Superintendent for their support, assistance and co-operation.
