WARRANT

To S. B. Loring, Constable of Carmel in said County:

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Carmel, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said town on Monday, the 6th day of March, A. D. 1933, at ten o'clock in forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To elect a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To elect a Town Clerk.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the Reports of the Municipal Officers as printed.

Art. 4. To elect three or more Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor.

Art. 5. To elect a Town Treasurer.

Art. 6. To elect one or more members of the Superintending School Committee.

Art. 7. To elect a Collector of Taxes and fix his compensation for same.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to elect a Road Commissioner or authorize the Selectmen to act as Road Commissioners.

Art. 9. To elect a Road Commissioner if the town so votes in the preceding article.

Art. 10. To elect a Fire Warden, Sextons, Surveyors of Wood, Bark and Lumber; Fence Viewers; Tramp Constable, Town Agent and Health Officer.

Art. 11. To fix the compensation of each of our several officers: First Selectman, Second Selectman, Third Selectman, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, Town Treasurer, Road Commissioner, Superintending School Committee, Fire Warden and raise money for the same.

Art. 12. To elect one or more Town Constables.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the following purposes:

For Roads, Bridges, Sidewalks—Summer.

Snow Fence.

Common Schools.

High School.

School Book Accounts.

School Contingent.

School House Repairs—Common.

High School Apparatus and Supplies.

Salary of Superintendent.

Interest on Common School Fund.

Interest on Loan on New School Buildings.

Note due on New Building.

Support of Poor.

Cutting Bushes on State, State Aid and Third Class Highways.

Memorial Day Exercises.

Care of Cemeteries.

Contingent Account.

Street Lights.

Mothers Aid.

Simpson Memorial Library.

Art. 14. To see what action the town will take in regard to the removal of snow the coming winter, and raise money for the same.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the improvement of section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, under provisions of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of Section 19 of 1916 or Chapter 258 P. L. 1917.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise money and for what sum for the maintenance of State Highway, State Aid Highway within the limits of said town under Sections 8 and 17, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will raise for Special Resolve Maintenance under Chapter 124 P. L. 1927.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to raise \$606.00 for the maintenance of third class roads, in order for the town to be entitled to third class apportionment, under the provisions of Section 4, Chapter 260, P. L. 1927.

Art. 20. To see if the town will raise money, and what sum, for the services of the County Nurse.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 to be expended on the Fuller road, so called, beginning at the so called John Hughes place and extending to the five road, so called, for the purpose of finishing ditching and surfacing.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to give the American Legion Post No. 107 (West Penobscot Post consisting of ex-service men from Carmel, Etna and surrounding towns) use of the upstairs room of the Damascus Schoolhouse. Alterations and repairs under the supervision of the Selectmen or School Board if any are made at the expense of the Post.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to abate the taxes on the property of Inez Dyer that the town now holds Tax Deeds on.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to authorize Harry S. Wise to post or otherwise mark U. S. Highway No. 2 on either or both sides of Auto Rest Park, situated in the Town of Carmel, as to warn travelers thereon, to expect cross traffic and to prevent the reoccurrence in so far as possible of the numerous collisions and accidents at these places. The foregoing for the exclusive benefit and safety of the Town of Carmel and the wayfarers on this highway, at the sole expense and discretion of the beforenamed Harry S. Wise both for erection and maintenance.

Art. 25. To see what wages the town will pay for trucks, teams and men working on highways this coming year, also what wages for men working on schoolhouse repairs.

Art. 26. To see what action the town will take on account of Boundary Book not being completed.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to abate the taxes of Nellie J. Day for life.

Art. 28. To see if the town will accept the sum of \$1,000.00 from the estate of F. Marion Simpson, to be placed in trust. The income to be used for the support and maintenance of Simpson Memorial Library.

Art. 29. To see what action the town will take in regards to Harold Meloon.

Art. 30. To see what action the town will take in regards to a claim for damages amounting to \$288.50, resulting from an accident with the Town's snow plow. This claim is for damage to automobile and injuries to self and family, presented by Earl Bean of Bangor, Maine.

Art. 31. To elect a Budget Committee for the next year.

Art. 32. To see if the town will sell all Tax Deeds, two years old.

Art. 33. To see if the town will appropriate and raise \$100.00 for Common School and \$85.00 for High Schools to restore balances.

Art. 34. To see what action the town will take in regards to overdrawing accounts.

Art. 35. To see what sum of money the town will raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources and attractions of the State of Maine.

Art. 36. To see if the town will make a schedule of rates for the rental of the Town Hall so that the town may receive added income for the rental.

Art. 37. To see if the town will accept the sum of \$200.00 in trust from the estate of B. W. Faden, the interest to be used for the care of the H. W. Shaw lot in Highland Cemetery.

Art. 38. To see if the town will accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust from Emma Bradford of Lewiston, the interest to be used for care of her lot in Highland Cemetery.

Art. 39. To see if the town will accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust from the estate of Helen Corliss, the interest to be used for care of the Helen Corliss lot.

Art. 40. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow from any Bank or Persons in the State of Maine, as a Temporary Loan or Loans to and for the use of the Town of Carmel, in anticipation of the taxes for the current year of 1933, sums of money in the aggregate not exceeding eight thousand dollars (\$8,000.00) and authorize the Treasurer of the town to execute the negotiable note or notes therefor, payable within time specified.

Art. 41. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting and raise money for same.

Art. 42. To see if the town will accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust from A. L. Chase, the interest to be used for the care of the Leonard Chase lot in Highland Cemetery.

Art. 43. To see if the town will accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust from H. J. Luce, the interest to be used for the care of the J. P. Luce lot in Highland Cemetery.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of Voters at the Town Hall at nine-thirty o'clock in the forenoon of said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the S. S. Committee and Citizens of the Town of Carmel:

I herewith submit the annual report of the public schools of Carmel for the year ending February 15, 1933.

Schools opened in September with a large increase in enrollment, Damascus, the Village, and Horseback schools having the largest enrollment for a number of years. This increase made necessary the purchase of extra equipment and text books.

Few changes were made in the teaching staff this year. All of our teachers are experienced, three are college graduates and three are graduates of normal schools. All of the elementary teachers are residents of Carmel. The teachers in spite of increased teaching loads, have worked faithfully and the results have been good. I wish to call your attention to the fact that we should have a slightly larger sum for text books this year. A workman cannot work without tools and a teacher can accomplish little without books. New geographies should be bought for the seventh grade and the lower grade readers are very inadequate.

Repairs

The school building at Damascus was shingled this year also the shed at the Partridge district. Within a year or so it will be necessary to shingle the Horseback school.

The most imperative need this year is the repair work on the Hinckley Hill shed and toilets. The Health Department has warned us that unless this work is done, the schoolhouse will not conform to Health laws and might be closed.

The sewer ditch and laying of drainage pipe at the "New Building" made necessary a large expenditure in the repairs account which it was impossible to foresee.

High School

The high school is in very prosperous condition. Harrison C. Lyseth, State Agent for Secondary Education, after a visit to the school last spring, expressed himself as being well pleased with the courses of study, the quality of instruction and discipline. He advised some minor changes in the building conditions in order to conform with requirements for a Class A high school. Under his direction, as specified by the State Department of Education the Eighty-five Dollars Equalization Fund received in December, 1931, was expended for a Doubleday's Encyclopedia and Popular Science for the school library.

Principal Erskine has made an excellent report of the year's work, therefore it will be unnecessary for me to make further comment.

Recommendations

The State Department has notified us that we must expect a reduction of eighteen to twenty per cent in the State School Fund next December. This will mean a reduction in Carmel of approximately four hundred dollars. While this is a blow somewhat hard to bear, I believe we can, by careful economy, still carry on without permanent injury to our school system. The estimates given below are, in my opinion, the lowest possible sums with which you can support your schools this year. Every item has been very carefully considered.

Report of High School Principal to the Superintendent and Superintending School Committee

I herewith submit my report for the year 1932-1933.

School opened September 6, 1932 with an enrollment of 64 pupils. Although a few dropped out, their places were filled by other pupils who entered late. Thus the enrollment has remained 64 pupils from the first day of school until the present date. The average enrollment for a 2-teacher high school in Maine for this year is 40 pupils.

Of these 64 pupils, 18 are tuition pupils, 13 are from Etna, 3 are from Dixmont and 2 are from Perry. According to law, the tuition charge is the per pupil cost of the previous year. A total amount of \$954.00 will be derived from tuition pupils this year. Most schools of this size have only 1 or 2 tuition pupils and their towns are obliged to raise by appropriation nearly double the amount raised last year or approximately \$2,200.00 to \$3,500.00. Carmel is indeed fortunate in this respect.

We have an inexperienced boys' basketball team this year with only one veteran. Against strong opposition in the few games played, the boys have made a very respectable showing. The girls with a veteran outfit have made a very good start toward a successful season.

COMMENTS

If not already doing so, kindly urge your children who are in high school to spend at least 2 hours per day in home study.

An Ideal Clarion Heater has been installed in the rear of the main room to supplement the old Kanstine Heater in the front of the room which on cold winter days does not always heat the rear of the room satisfactorily.

The High School Orchestra and Glee Club are doing splendid work in providing instrumental and vocal musical education. Superintendent Carter has charge of the High School Orchestra and Miss Oliver, the Glee Club.

The Class A Certificate for another year issued by the State Department of Education has been received and posted on the bulletin board.

Janitor service has been excellent.

Recent graduates attending college, business colleges or other higher schools are doing satisfactory work.

Good progress has been made in all subjects.

Short selections on Character and Personality development are read each morning in Assembly.

In closing, let me thank the Superintendent, School Board, Parents and friends of the school for their splendid co-operation and support.
