To S. B. Loring, Constable of Carmel in said County,

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Carmel, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said town on Monday, March fifth, A. D. 1934, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To elect a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To elect a Town Clerk.

Art. 3. To see if the town will accept the reports of the Municipal Officers as printed.

Art. 4. To elect three or more Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor.

Art. 5. To elect a Town Treasurer.

Art. 6. To elect one or more members of the Superintending School Committee.

Art. 7. To elect a Collector of Taxes and fix his compensation.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to elect a Road Commissioner or authorize the Selectmen to act as Road Commissioners.

Art. 9. To elect a Road Commissioner, if the town so votes in the preceeding article.

Art. 10. To elect a Fire Warden, Sextons, Surveyors of Wood, Bark and Lumber; Fence Viewers, Tramp Constable and Town Agent.

Art. 11. To fix the Compensation of our several officers: First Selectman, Second Selectman, Third Selectman, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, Town Treasurer, Road Commissioner, Superintending School Committee, Fire Warden, and raise money for the same.

Art. 12. To elect one or more Town Constables.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the following purposes:

For Roads, Bridges, Sidewalks—Summer

Snow Fence

Common Schools

High School

School Book Account

Salary of Superintendent

Interets on Common School Fund

Note Due on New Building

Interest on Loan on New School Building

Support of Poor

Cutting Bushes on State, State Aid and Third

Art. 14. To see what action the town will take in regard to the removal of snow the coming winter, and raise money for the same.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the improvement of the section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission (in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 175, Public Laws of 1933.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise money, and what sum, for the maintenance of State Highway, State Aid Highway within the limits of said town, under Sections 8 and 17, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will raise for Special Resolve Maintenance, under Chapter 124, P. L. 1927.

Art. 19. To see if the town will raise the sum of \$485.00 for the Maintenance of Third Class Roads, in order for the town to be entitled to Third Class Apportionment under the provisions of the amendments of Sec. 5 suspending Sec. 46 of Chapter 175, P. L. 1933.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 to be expended on the Fuller Road, so-called, beginning at the so-called John Smith place and extending

towards the John Hughes place, so-called, for the purpose of finishing and surfacing.

Art. 21. To see what wages the town will pay for trucks, teams and men working on highways this coming year, also what wages for men working on school house repairs.

Art. 22. To see if the town will accept the sum of \$100 from the estate of Clara E. Johnson, in trust, the interest to be used for the care of the Johnson lot in Highland Cemetery.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to close schools in town in bad weather and when the roads are in bad condition.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to pay Sarah Maloon for her horse that broke its leg on the highway in Carmel.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$175.00 for chairs in Town Hall, owned by E. F. Robinson.

Art. 26. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow from any bank or persons in the State of Maine, as a temporary loan or loans to and for the use of the Town of Carmel, in anticipation of the taxes for the year of 1934, sums of money in the aggregate not to exceed three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) and fix the rate of interest for same, and authorize the Treasurer of the town to execute the negotiable note or notes therefor, payable within time specified.

Art. 27. To elect a Budget Committee for the next year.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to sell all tax deeds two (2) years old or over.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to raise \$450.00 to pay for one half of material used and to be used on school buildings and town hall under C. W. A. projects.

Art. 30. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting, and raise money for same.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to take one unit of excise tax, \$533.00, for State Aid Road, and the balance with all of other monies received from uncollected taxes and tax deeds to pay Mrs. Berniece Ruggles' note of \$1,000.00, and outstanding snow bills.

Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to buy two (2) lot charts of Highland Cemetery from Mrs. Ralph Hardy, and raise money for the same.

Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to instruct the School Committee and Supt. of Schools of the Town of Carmel, not to hire any woman who is married, or has a family of any kind, to teach school in said Town of Carmel.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the Town Hall at nine-thirty o'clock in the forenoon of said meeting.

To the S. S. Committee and Citizens of the Town of Carmel:

I herewith submit the annual report of the public schools for the year ending February 15, 1934.

Schools opened in September with one change in the teaching staff. Miss Ruth Hatfield, a normal graduate with several years' experience, was engaged to teach the intermediate grades. The enrollment has been increased this year and the seating at the village school has proved a problem. Several seats should be bought this year.

In spite of the fact that our teachers are receiving less than the minimum wage for unskilled labor under the N. R. A., all have shown an unselfish spirit of sacrifice and devotion to their schools. I can commend the work of each teacher, for all have worked faithfully and well.

TEXT BOOKS

Necessary replacements have been made this year but we were not able to buy the much-needed new geographies for seventh and eighth grades. New dictionaries are very much needed, as well as penmanship manuals for all grades.

REPAIRS

Through the C. W. A. project, we were fortunate to be able to do considerable interior cleaning and painting on the rural schoolhouses and the village school. The parents at the Hinckley Hill and Partridge districts contributed paper for re-papering, and the ceiling was re-finished at Hinckley Hill. The school buildings at this time are clean and attractive.

The out-buildings at the rural schools and at the High School should be put into a healthful and sanitary condition. This is a State law requirement. (Sec. 42 of Chap. 33, R. S.)

The Hinckley Hill shed should be repaired this year, the Horseback school should be shingled, and new air-valves should be purchased for the radiators at the village school-

house. Other desirable improvements include the hanging of the doors between the intermediate and grammar rooms, and a cement floor for the north basement room. While this would make necessary a much larger repair account than usual, it should be remembered that for the past few years, not much new work has been included in repairs.

CONVEYANCES

All motor conveyances must conform to a minimum standard under a law passed by the last Legislature. One linear foot of seating space should be given each child. This will require either larger conveyances or two trips each way for our conveyors, and they should receive a larger rate of salary. A violation of the new conveyance law means that either the town or the conveyor becomes liable for fines. I call your attention to this fact in order that you may take care of any extra expense involved in bringing about conveyance facilities that will come under the provisions of the law.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the S. S. Committee for their encouragement and support, the municipal officers, parents, teachers, and citizens, for their co-operation in my work.

In the 50 (two teacher) high schools of Maine this year, the average pupil enrollment is 41 pupils and the average cost per pupil is \$82.82. Only 3 other 2 teacher high schools have a lower cost per pupil than Carmel High School. Their rates are only slightly lower. This high school is now one of the largest (two teacher) high schools in Maine. St. George, Pembroke and Oxford high schools have slightly larger enrollments.

These figures clearly show that the cost of a high school education per year per pupil is much less in Carmel than in the majority of towns of similar size.

During the summer and Christmas vacations, the main room was enlarged, thoroughly cleaned and redecorated. The foundation of the building was made stronger. A very satisfactory class room was constructed from two second floor rooms. Part of this work was done by C. W. A. workers.

Due partly at least to much improved studying conditions which are a direct result of this work on the H. S. building, in general, the work of the pupils in their subjects has very noticeably improved over that of the last two years at least. It is very difficult for pupils to study when aisles between seats are too narrow. The aisles are very wide now. Both faculty and pupils wish to express their appreciation to the citizens for the improvements made in the building. Splendid progress is being made in all subjects and due to the wider aisles, in school hours, the pupils are more orderly than they have been since I have been principal.

Miss Oliver has very capably discharged her duties and has given much time and effort to the outside activities connected with the school.

CHANGES OR ADDITIONS TO COURSES

Parliamentary law or the rules for conducting public meeting is being taught under the Community Civics Course for 10 weeks.

A Senior Review Course consisting of a very short but intensive review of some of the fundamentals taught in the higher elementary grades has been introduced this year. Not having had this training for from four to six years, our seniors forget much of the material which they mastered once. It very quickly comes back to them after a few weeks of the new Senior Review Course.

Only 15 minutes per day for 20 weeks are devoted to this course. Some of the material covered will include spelling, geography, simple arithmetic (lumber measure, papering, painting, etc.) While such material is not given at all in high school usually, it has been thought that the material is of such value that a short but intensive review would be profitable.

Since farming and dairying are important local industries, it has been thought wise to include the study of the Elementary Principles of Farming and Dairying under Biology (study of plants and animals). We hope that this will stimulate our pupils to take a greater interest in farming. It is taught with the idea that the ideal combination for a farmer is 75% practical experience and 25% theory and training in Modern Farming Methods.

OUTSIDE ACTIVITIES

In general, our outside activities have been successful and our treasury is in fair condition. Athletic prospects are a little brighter. Our greatest hardship now is competing with teams having from 2 to 3 (two hr.) practice periods per week. We are limited to one practice period per week.

Very important musical training is being given the pupils by Supt. Carter in the High School Orchestra and by Miss Oliver in the Glee Club. Both Supt. Carter and Miss Oliver deserve credit for their voluntary work in these organizations.

Janitor service has been very satisfactory.

I wish to express my appreciation to the Superintendent and School Board, parents and friends of the school for their generous co-operation, support and for their many acts of kindness and consideration.
