State of Maine

To *L. D. French, Constable of Carmel, in said County,*

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Carmel, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said town on Monday, March seventh, A. D. 1938, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To elect a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To elect a Town Clerk.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the reports of the municipal officers.

Art. 4. To elect three or more Selectmen, Assessors, and Overseers of the Poor.

Art. 5. To elect a Town Treasurer.

Art. 6. To elect one or more members of the Superintending School Committee.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to elect a Road

Commissioner or authorize the Selectmen to act as Road Commissioners.

Art. 8. To elect a Road Commissioner if the town so votes in the preceeding article.

Art. 9. To elect a Fire Warden, Sextons, Surveyors of Wood, Bark and Lumber; Fence Viewers, Tramp Constable, Town Agent and Health Officer.

Art. 10. To fix the compensation of our several officers: First Selectman, Second Selectman, Third Selectman, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, Road Commissioner, Superintending School Committee, Fire Warden, and raise money for the same.

Art. 11. To elect one or more Town Constables.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the following purposes:

For Roads, Bridges, Sidewalks—Summer.

Snow Fence.

Common Schools, Textbooks and Supplies, Lights.

Insurance for school houses and conveyance.

High School.

High School Repairs.

School House Repairs.

Salary of Superintendent.

Interest on Common School Fund.

Note Due on New Building.

Interest on Loans on New Building.

Support of Poor.

Cutting Bushes on State, State Aid and Third Class Highways.

Memorial Day for Flags and Exercises.
 Care of Cemeteries.
 Contingent Account.
 Street Lights.
 Mothers' Aid.
 Simpson Memorial Library.
 Snow Removal.

Art. 13. To elect a Collector of Taxes and fix his compensation.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate for State Aid Road Construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of Ways, Highways and Bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and what sum, for maintenance of State Aid Highways within the limits of said town under Section 8 and 17, Chapter 25 of Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will raise for Special Resolve Maintenance under Chapter 124, Public Laws of 1927.

Art. 17. To see if the town will raise the sum of \$619.00 for the maintenance of Third Class Roads, in order for the town to be entitled to Third Class Apportionment under the provisions of the amendments of Section 5, suspending Section 46 of Chapter 175, Public Laws of 1933.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the maintenance of the Fuller Road so-called, beginning

at John Hewes place so-called, extending to John Smith place, so-called.

Art. 19. To see what action the town will take in regard to digging and maintaining a ditch on the east side of the Village School lot, and raise money for same.

Art. 20. To see what action the town will take in regard to removal of snow from the Village School yard.

Art. 21. To see what action the town will take in regard to reconditioning the main room at the High School, and raise money for same (estimated \$500.00).

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will raise to build sink and dish cupboards in the balcony at Town Hall.

Art. 23. To see what action the town will take relative to the use of the Town Hall by the schools and other local units, for dancing school rehearsals or any other public benefit.

Art. 24. To see what wages the town will vote to pay for trucks, teams and men working on highway for the ensuing year; also for men working on school house repairs.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to reimburse W. W. Estey and D. W. Harrington for taxes on personal property and buildings lost by fire.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to refund Addie B. Gray to the sum of sixty dollars (\$60.00) adjustment for taxes paid by Addie B. Gray on camp ground property since 1911.

Art. 27. To see if the town will accept the sum of \$100.00 from the estate of Elisha Hopkins in trust, the interest to be used for the care of Hopkins lot in Highland Cemetery.

Art. 28. To see if the town will accept the sum of \$100.00 from the estate of John Benjamin in trust, the interest to be used for the care of Benjamin lot in Highland Cemetery.

Art. 29. To see if the town will accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust, the interest to be used for the care of the Whitten lot in Highland Cemetery.

Art. 30. To see if the town will authorize the Superintending School Committee to act with the Board of Selectmen in purchasing wood for the schools of the town regardless of bids received from other sources.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to raise \$100.00 for the maintenance of the Horse Back Road, so-called.

Art. 32. To see if the town will authorize the Town Treasurer to deduct from wages of all town employees, truck service or supplies furnished the town either of the following portions thereof—25%, 33 $\frac{1}{3}$ % or 50%, the same to be applied to taxes.

Art. 33. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of reducing the town indebtedness.

Art. 34. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow from any bank, or persons

in the State of Maine as a temporary loan or loans to and for the use of the Town of Carmel in anticipation of taxes for the year 1938, sums of money in the aggregate not to exceed six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00) and fix rate of interest for same, and authorize the treasurer of the town to execute negotiable note or notes therefor, payable within the time specified.

Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property.

Art. 36. To see what action the town will take regarding readjusting the assets of the town.

Art. 37. To see what action the town will take about cleaning up dump on old railroad bed and raise money for same; also, to see what action will be taken to acquire some parcel of land to be used as a public dump, and raise money for same.

Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to abate the taxes of O. H. McLaughlin for the year 1937 and if so, what portion of said tax shall be abated.

Art. 39. To transact any further business that may legally come before said meeting and raise money for the same.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the Town Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon of said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Carmel:

I hereby submit my annual report of the schools of Carmel for the municipal year ending February 15, 1938:

TEACHERS

Schools opened September 7th with the following teachers and enrollment:

Village Grammar—Mr. Dodson,	40 pupils

Total enrollment,	234 pupils
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The following new teachers were hired at the beginning of the fall term: High school assistant, Arthur Homan of Hermon; Primary, Madelene Buck of Stetson; Partridge, Arline Ford of Dixmont; and Damascus, Emma Newcomb of Hampden. On resignation of Mrs. Newcomb at the end of the fall term, Mrs. Teel of Cranberry Isles was hired for the Damascus school. All of the new teachers are either normal or college trained and have had experience. The other positions are filled by teachers who have taught in town for several terms. In general, the work has progressed very smoothly, and the teachers are giving their best

to their respective schools. We are glad to receive comments and suggestions from the parents, and try to profit by them. Why not visit the schools more often? It encourages better cooperation between home and school for the betterment of the children.

The attendance for the fall term was exceptionally fine. There were many children who did not miss one day and there was very little tardiness.

TEXTBOOKS

The schools are fairly well supplied with textbooks at this time. It will be necessary to make some changes soon to conform with state requirements. Some additions should be made to the required reading in the English department of the high school, and the English books in the grammar grades should be changed for more modern texts. The reading course in the upper grades should be broadened, and each school-room should be supplied with a small library of supplementary and reference material. Miss Bennett and Mrs. Buck have made an excellent start in this direction by their "reading tables."

ORGANIZATIONS

I am glad to acknowledge the excellent cooperation of the Parent-Teacher Association, the Simpson Memorial Library, the Highway Forum, and the Four-H Club. These organizations are supplementing the work of the schools in a wholesome and practical manner. The Parent-Teacher Association is open to anyone who is interested in education. The meetings are held on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month, and we cordially invite you to attend.

REPAIRS

The Partridge school house was remodeled with standard lighting during the fall term. This makes a modern, comfortable school-room, and a distinct saving in fuel has been

effected by placing the windows on the south side. All of our school houses now have the standard lighting except Damascus, and it is hoped that the town will raise the money to complete this project this year. The cost will be approximately \$150. Other necessary repair work will be: the fencing of part of the Village school lot, graveling for the Village and High School driveway, and the regular repairs of a minor nature, replacements, and janitor supplies.

HIGH SCHOOL

For a detailed account of the activities of the High School, I refer you to Principal Ingalls' report. Mr. Lyseth, State Agent for Secondary Schools, visited the school this year. We have received our Class A rating from the State, but Mr. Lyseth calls attention to the fact that the physical conditions of the building need to be greatly improved. The school committee has made an excellent beginning by a thorough renovation of the English room. The new sills were placed under the building during the summer vacation. The main room should be renovated by laying a new floor, painting the wood work, refinishing the walls, and refitting the desks. A saving can be effected by putting new tops on the desks, since new desks would cost about four hundred dollars.

For the past few years there has been a group of people in town who have urged the abolishment of the high school. I will ask this group to consider the following facts: First, if there were no high school in Carmel, the children of secondary school age could attend any high school in Maine and the town would become responsible for the payment of the tuition up to \$100 per year per child. Second, the cost of board or transportation would be a large item for some of the parents to consider and probably would prevent some of the children from going beyond the elementary school. Most parents prefer to have their children under the home care and influence during the high school age, an age

that is so important to a child's adjustments in later life. Taking these facts into consideration, I believe the people will continue to support Carmel High School.

BUDGET RECOMMENDATIONS

The following budget has been unanimously approved by the Superintending School Committee:

REPORT OF HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

*To the Superintendent and the Superintending School
Committee:*

I herewith submit my report as Principal of Carmel High School.

School opened on August 30 with an enrollment of forty-three, distributed by classes as follows:

The average attendance of nearly ninety-six per cent for the Fall Term can be equaled by very few secondary schools of this size in the State and indicates a fine cooperation on the part of the parents in insisting upon a steady daily attendance at school.

A course in practical mathematics has replaced algebra in the freshman and sophomore years and should prove of greater value to the majority of students who do not attend college. Our aim is to modernize the curriculum and eliminate formal and meaningless courses which are ineffective as learning experiences and which thwart any approach to pupil need or interest.

Mr. Homan is endeavoring to integrate the whole English program and to develop a fine reading program for all classes and with his superior knowledge of all phases of

English excellent progress in this department is being made.

The absence of adequate and continued guidance service leaves innumerable necessary pupil adjustments neglected and ignored with serious loss to both students and community. However, I will say that with the close teacher-pupil contact of the small school we can do more in guidance than many larger schools.

There has been serious question in the past as to whether the program of physical education built enough muscular to offset the emotional disturbances occasioned by many of the situations developed. By de-emphasizing the victory motive and encouraging wholesale participation in the basketball program I am happy to report that twenty-five of our forty-three enrolled are taking daily part and a majority of the remainder have signified their intentions of entering this activity next year.

In connection with basketball I wish to thank A. J. McGown & Sons for their kind gift of wood to heat the town hall for practice sessions.

The school committee has made a splendid move in renovating the English room and they contemplate further changes and improvements in the plant which should receive the whole-hearted support of all citizens.

I wish to thank Mrs. Carter and the School Committee for their counsel and support, Mr. Homan for his constant cooperation, also Mr. Elsmore and the elementary teachers.

As in previous years I urge the citizens of Carmel to visit the high school and inspect the work of both teachers and pupils.
