State of Maine.

To L. D. French, Constable of Carmel in said County,

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Carmel, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said town on Monday, March fourth, A. D. 1940, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To elect a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To elect a Town Clerk.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the reports of the Municipal Officers.

Art. 4. To elect three or more Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor.

Art. 5. To elect a Town Treasurer.

Art. 6. To elect two or more members of the Superintending School Committee.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to elect a Road Commissioner or authorize the Selectmen to act as Road Commissioners.

Art. 8. To elect a Road Commissioner if the town so votes in the preceding article.

Art. 9. To elect a Fire Warden, Sextons, Surveyors of Wood, Bark and Lumber, Fence Viewers, Tramp Constable and Town Agent.

Art. 10. To fix the compensation of our several officers: First Selectman, Second Selectman, Third Selectman, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, Road Commissioner, Superintending School Committee, Fire Warden, and raise money for the same.

Art. 11. To elect one or more Town Constables.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the following purposes:

Roads, Bridges, Sidewalks—Summer.

Snow Fence.

Common Schools, Textbooks and Supplies, Lights.

Insurance on School Buildings.

High School (Repairs, Lights, Supplies).

Schoolhouse Repairs.

Salary of School Superintendent.

Interest on Common School Fund.

Support of Poor, Veterans Aid, Aid of Dependent Children.

Cutting Bushes on State, State Aid and Third Class Highways.

Memorial Day.

Care of Cemeteries.

Contingent Account.

Note due on New Building.

Street Lights.

Aid of Dependent Children (Mothers' Aid).

Simpson Memorial Library.

Removal of Snow.

Interest on Notes Payable.

Art. 13. To elect a Collector of Taxes and fix his compensation.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate for State Aid Construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of Ways, Highways and Bridges) under the provisions of Sec. 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and what sum for maintenance of State and State Aid Highways within the limits of said town under Sections 8 and 17, Chapter 25 of Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 16. To see what sum the town will raise for Special Resolve Maintenance under Chapter 124, Public Laws of 1927.

Art. 17. To see if the town will raise the sum of \$711.00 for the maintenance of Third Class Roads, in order for the town to be entitled to Third Class apportionment under the provisions of the amendments of Section 5, suspending Section 46 of Chapter 175, Public Laws of 1933.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise \$100.00 for the maintenance of the Fuller Road, so-called, beginning at the John Hewes place, so-called, and extending to the Five Road.

Art. 19. To see what wages the town will pay for trucks, teams and men working on Highways for the ensuing year.

Art. 20. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$90.00 for Public Health work in Carmel, said

sum to be expended by the Bureau of Health and Welfare, State Department, in cooperation with local authorities.

Art. 21. To see what action the town will take in regard to repairing the basement of the Town Hall and raise money for the same.

Art. 22. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to deduct from wages of all town employees, truck service, 50% to be applied to payment of taxes.

Art. 23. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of reducing the town indebtedness.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on payment of cash and to execute quit claim deeds for such property.

Art. 25. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for W. P. A. projects.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 to be expended on the so-called Sylvester Road, leading from the Fuller Road to Clarence Sylvester's residence.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen during the municipal year to refund certain then outstanding indebtedness of the town, to an amount not exceeding \$8,000.00, with serial bonds bearing a rate of interest not exceeding 3%, the Selectmen to determine the date of issue, rate of interest, price, place of payment, and any other details necessary in connection with the issue and the refunding of the indebtedness with the proceeds.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to make a reduction on the taxes for the year 1939-40 on the Estate of Mrs. O. A. Emery, and raise money for the same.

Art. 29. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow from any bank or persons, in the State of Maine, as a temporary loan or loans, to and for the use of the Town of Carmel in anticipation of taxes for the year 1940, sums of money in the aggregate not to exceed three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) and fix rate of interest for same and authorize the Treasurer to execute negotiable note or notes therefor, payable within time specified.

Art. 30. To transact any other business that may come before the meeting, legally, and raise money for the same.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the Town Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon of said meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING SERVICE, 1939

The public health nursing service covers the nurse supervision of expectant mothers, infants, preschool and school age children. The report covers this general program and it is for this purpose which we are asking to have money raised to help continue the work by supplementing what is already being paid from State Bureau of Health funds. The work is carried largely through home visits and child health conferences. These contacts are made for the purpose of giving help in meeting the health needs of the family through advice and demonstration of methods of care in the home.

The encouragement of parents in the care of the family is most gratefully received. Through the nurses' home visits, medical supervision is urged where needed for treatment or correction of defects.

The importance of using the proper diet for maintenance of health and normal growth is discussed with families and aid given in planning food budgets.

The protection of children with communicable diseases, the protection of others from those who are ill and immunization against certain diseases is stressed. Whenever possible, child health conferences are held with the local people making the choice of examining physician and the State Bureau of Health paying for his services. The nurse is always alert to any crippling condition in children and with the consent of the physician, the services of the crippled children clinics, which are held in several sections of the State, are recommended to the family.

As other defects are found, the nurse calls these conditions to the attention of the parents with recommenda-

tions to secure advice from physicians or dentists regarding care or treatment. In cases where the cost of corrective work cannot be assumed by the family, the nurse endeavors to enlist the interest of groups or agencies to assist in meeting these needs.

A child health conference was held in the home of the Town Clerk, because of the inadequacy of the Town Hall. Toxoid was again offered. Another conference will be held this coming summer.

Schick testing was done to complete the immunization program.

The Audiometer has been used in all the schools and in the high school.

A good number of contacts who were positive to the tuberculin test were X-rayed by Miss Gay who brought a portable X-ray machine to Carmel. Continued follow-up is evident from X-ray reports. Due to the interest shown in the town regarding tuberculosis, skin testing will be done in the upper grades this spring.

Families have availed themselves of the Crippled Children's Service. Continued health teaching has been carried on throughout the year.

In the selection of teachers, your committee and superintendent look for successful teaching experience coupled with professional training. We realize that probably the most important single factor in the success of a school is the teacher. We believe that your present staff is of high professional standard and can be commended for faithful work in guiding the future citizens of Carmel.

HIGH SCHOOL

The high school has had a large attendance this year with several tuition students from Etna. The scholastic and extra-curricular work has been of high standard. For a detailed account, I refer you to Principal Ingall's report.

By building up a strong high school, it should be possible to attract more tuition pupils. The state recommends a third teacher for Carmel high, putting in a part or full-time agricultural course. This course is partly subsidized by the State and Federal funds "In general one-third the cost of instruction up to certain limits is paid from State, one-third from Federal, and one-third from local funds."

TEXT BOOKS

Some of the equalization money has been expended to buy maps, an encyclopedia for the Village school, and a small collection of library books for each rural school. These purchases were authorized by the school board, and recommended by the state department.

REPAIRS

Most of the repair money was spent at the Hinckley Hill and Horseback schools. The shingling was completed at Hinckley Hill, and the buildings received interior painting. A few emergency repairs were necessary which could not be foreseen. Your committee has been as economical as possible, but an overdraft could not be avoided.

FINANCES

The equalization fund which enabled the town to have 36 weeks of school was slightly reduced this year. This fund is granted to those towns having a school rate in excess of the state average. In 1940, Carmel will receive \$1252, based on the 1939 rate of .01489. In order to continue to be eligible to receive equalization, it is important that the school rate should fall below this figure.

REPORT OF HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

To the Superintendent and the Superintending School Committee

I herewith submit my report as Principal of Carmel High School:

School opened on September 5 with an enrollment of sixty, a marked increase over the minimum of thirty-eight reached a year ago. The average attendance has been exceptionally high, twenty-one pupils not being absent for any session during the Fall Term.

Considering mental ability, I believe the student body is more homogeneous than in years past and a very satisfactory standard of scholastic achievement is being maintained.

New seats, new textbooks, reference material, periodicals and additional laboratory equipment have enabled the teachers to supplement and broaden the daily class program.

We have yet to establish a satisfactory extra-curricula activity program for all. There is an over-emphasis on basketball as an interscholastic sport but this is a difficult thing to adjust, many other schools suffering from the same thing but finding it almost impossible to break away from the general trend. Besides basketball, prize speaking, the usual plays and table tennis, we hope to add badminton and softball in the Spring Term. A yearbook is contemplated and a foundation for a school orchestra has been laid. It is hoped the orchestra may be ready for a public appearance by the end of the school year.

Although the American people traditionally place tremendous faith in education, the recent years of economic

stress have brought with them an increasingly critical attitude toward the values of education. The secondary school must therefore justify itself by more than academic opinion if it is to continue to receive the support of the public. This will be determined largely by the degree to which the high schools develop a program of education and activity whereby every boy and girl, regardless of ability or talent, can profit by this extended education, and demonstrate the fact by contributing to the stabilization and improvement of our democratic society.

In closing, I want to thank Mrs. Carter, the School committee and my assistants, Mrs. Kittredge and Mrs. Hamm for their cooperation in making the school year thus far a success. We invite the citizens of Carmel to visit their high school at any time and inspect the work of the institution.
