



State of Maine

To *L. D. French, Constable of Carmel, in said County,*

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Carmel, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said town on Monday, March 3rd, A. D. 1941 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To elect a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To elect a Town Clerk.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the reports of the Municipal Officers as presented.

Art. 4. To elect three or more Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor.

Art. 5. To elect a Town Treasurer.

Art. 6. To elect one or more members of the Superintending School Committee.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to elect a Road Commissioner or authorize the Selectmen to act as Road Commissioners.

Art. 8. To elect a Road Commissioner, if the town so votes in the preceding article.

Art. 9. To elect a Fire Warden, Sextons, Surveyors of Wood, Bark and Lumber, Fence Viewers, Tramp Constable and Town Agent.

Art. 10. To fix the compensation of our several officers: First Selectman, Second Selectman, Third Selectman, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, Road Commissioner, Superintending School Committee, Fire Warden, and raise money for the same.

Art. 11. To elect one or more Town Constables.

Art. 12. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the following purposes:

Roads, Bridges, Sidewalks (Summer).

Snow Fence.

Common Schools, Textbooks and Supplies, Lights.

Insurance on School Buildings.

High School (Repairs, Lights and Supplies).

School House Repairs.

Salary of School Superintendent.

Interest on Common School Fund.

Support of Poor, Veterans Aid, Aid to Dependent Children.

Cutting Bushes on State, State Aid and Third Class Highways.

Memorial Day.

Care of Cemeteries.

Contingent Account.

Notes on New Building.

Street Lights.

Aid to Dependent Children (Mothers' Aid).

Simpson Memorial Library.

Removal of Snow.

Interest on Notes Payable.

Art. 13. To elect a Collector of Taxes and fix his compensation.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate for State Aid Construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise money, and what sum for maintenance of State and State Aid Highways within the limits of said town under Sections 8 and 17, Chapter 25 of Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Special Resolve Maintenance, under Chapter 124, Public Laws 1927.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$760.00 for the maintenance of Third Class Roads, in order for the town to be entitled to Third Class Apportionment under the provisions of the amendments of Section 46 of Chapter 175, Public Laws of 1933.

Art. 18. To see what action the town will take in regard to the designation of the Third Class Road Fund apportioned to the town under the provisions of the amendments of Section 5, suspending Section 46 of Chapter 175, Public Laws of 1933.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 for the maintenance of the Fuller Road, so-called, beginning at the John Hewes place, so-called, and extending to the Five Road, so-called.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum

of \$100.00 for the maintenance of the Horseback Road, so-called.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to raise \$150.00 for graveling and smoothing the Five Road, so-called, from the State Road in Carmel Village to the Fuller Road, so-called, if not designated as Third Class Road.

Art. 22. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$90.00 for public health work in Carmel, said sum to be expended by the Bureau of Health and Welfare, State Department, in cooperation with local authorities.

Art. 23. To see what rate of wages the town will vote to pay for trucks, teams, and men working for the town for the ensuing year.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to deduct from the wages of all town employees a percentage of the same to be applied to the payment of taxes, and fix the rate.

Art. 25. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of reducing the town's indebtedness.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, on behalf of the town, to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on payment of cash and to execute Quit Claim Deeds for such property, or to take any other legal action necessary to acquire possession of, and sell said property.

Art. 27. To see what action the town will take in regard to a W.P.A. Project, and raise money for the same.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to reimburse E. S.

Drew and Everett Garland the taxes on buildings burned in 1940 and raise money for the same.

Art. 29. To see what action the town will take with reference to abatement of personal taxes six years past due and over, and the unpaid personal taxes of persons deceased, and raise money for the same.

Art. 30. To see what action the town will take in regard to putting the High School Building in shape to comply with the requirements of the State Department of Education, or to take any other action necessary to meet State requirements, and raise money for the same.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to raise money, and what sum for the improvement of the Dunham Road, so-called, beginning at the east line of lot 25 and extending to Ralph Emery's residence.

Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to raise money and what sum, for the improvement of the Ash Hill Road, so-called.

Art. 33. To see what action the town will take regarding the purchase of the snow plow now owned by Harold Brown.

Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow from any bank or persons in the State of Maine, as a temporary loan or loans, to and for the use of the Town of Carmel, in anticipation of taxes for the year 1941, sums of money in the aggregate not to exceed three thousand dollars, (\$3,000.00) and fix the rate of interest for the same, and authorize the Treasurer of the town to execute the negotiable note or notes therefor, payable within the time specified.

Art. 35. To see what action the town will take in regard to Tar Treatment of Improved Highways, and raise money for the same.

Art. 36. To transact any other business that may come become the meeting, legally.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the Town Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon of the day of the said meeting.

REPORT OF HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

To the Superintendent and the Superintending School Committee:

I herewith submit my report as Principal of Carmel High School.

School opened with an enrollment of sixty-six which is above the 30-1 pupil-teacher ratio allowed by the Department of Education. Thus, we have received only tentative approval as a Class A school. With only seven graduating and an expected entering class in September of twenty or more, the need for a third teacher becomes imperative. I know you recognize the inadequacy of our present facilities and will doubtless receive definite recommendations relative thereto from Mrs. Carter.

We have maintained a full program of extra-curricula activities. A school play with a cast drawn from the several classes was well done. The Junior Prize Speaking Contest under the direction of Miss Barstow was the finest program of its kind we have ever presented. A half-hour radio program under the auspices of the Maine State Police was presented over Station WABI and was well received. The boys basketball team still suffers from a lack of seasoned material and specialized coaching; the girls team, on the other hand, has been most successful, winning the championship of the Central League after finishing second a year ago.

Coming events which will find members of our student body taking part are the Senior Class play, the county speaking contest, the University of Maine speaking contest,

the State One-Act Play contest, and publication of a school yearbook.

I want to thank Miss Barstow for her excellent assistance at all times. In her first year of teaching she has been most successful. Also, Mr. J. Lyman Chandler for his kind assistance to us in presenting our radio program and minstrel show; Mr. Harold Bickford for the excellent condition of the school building; parents and friends who have used their automobiles in transporting our basketball players; and Mrs. Carter and the Committee for their constant guidance and assistance.

I herewith submit the annual report of the schools of Carmel.

Of the three new teachers, Mrs. Archer is a graduate of Washington Normal School with two years' experience; Miss Littlefield was graduated from Farmington Normal; Miss Barstow has her degree from the University of Maine. Carmel has a staff of competent, enthusiastic teachers whose value to their respective schools cannot be adequately measured in dollars and cents. I have no hesitation in saying that they are successful.

TEXTBOOKS

Necessary replacements were made in textbooks this year. A set of maps for Hinckley Hill School, a small encyclopedia for Damascus School, and other reference materials were bought. New health books for the upper grades are needed, and elementary science should be given in preparation for the biology and general science of the high school. Although Simpson Memorial Library has been very helpful, small libraries for each school should be supplemented each year. The State course requires book reports and supplementary reading beginning with the fifth grade.

HIGH SCHOOL

The high school has had the highest enrollment of its history and for the next four years, according to our present grade enrollment, it will continue to increase. Although the academic work and extra-curricular activities have been of high standard for a small school, it is not possible for two teachers to carry on as efficiently with the pupil-teacher ratio over thirty. The building does not meet State requirements and changes must be made in order to continue as a Class A school. New seats must be bought to accommodate fifteen to eighteen new pupils.

We have had ten tuition pupils this year from Etna and Stetson. We can probably count on about the same number for 1941-42. This will give approximately four hundred eighty dollars.

Extra-curricular activities at the high school have included plays, prize speaking, basketball, and a year book for the Seniors. Both Miss Barstow and Mr. Ingalls have shown active enthusiasm for their work and have the cooperation of the students and parents to a large degree.

Mr. Lyseth and Mr. Libby of the State Department of Education plan to be in Carmel soon and will hold an open meeting for the discussion of improvements required in the high school building. Contrary to rumored reports,

the State does not recommend closing Carmel High School. It is interested only in making it conform to State standards. Why not plan to attend this meeting and find out what is required and recommended?

I firmly believe that the parents of our fine group of boys and girls are interested and willing to do everything within their power to help Carmel High School. The school is a community asset and can be made more so. Do *your* part to boost its value.

FINANCES

The Equalization Fund was used to maintain thirty-six weeks of school and to buy reference books, purposes for which it is ear-marked by the State. Due to a slight reduction in the Carmel school rate, Carmel will receive about \$200.00 less in Equalization in 1941.
