# TOWN WARRANT

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Penobscot, ss.

State of Maine

*To L. D. French, Constable of Carmel, in said County,*

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Carmel, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said town on Monday, March 6, A. D. 1944, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To elect a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To elect a town clerk.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the reports of the municipal officers as printed.

Art. 4. To elect three or more selectmen, assessors, and overseers of the poor.

Art. 5. To elect a town treasurer.

Art. 6. To elect one or more members of the superintending school committee.

Art. 7. To see if the town will elect a road commissioner or authorize the selectmen to act as road commissioners.

Art. 8. To elect a road commissioner if the town so votes in the preceding article.

Art. 9. To elect a fire warden; sexton; surveyors of wood, bark and lumber; fence viewers; tramp constable, excise tax collector, and town agent.

Art. 10. To fix the compensation of our several officers. First selectman; second selectman; third selectman; assessors; overseers of the poor; road commissioner; superintending school committee; town treasurer; fire warden, and raise money for the same.

Art. 11. To elect one or more town constables.

Art. 12. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for the following purposes:

Roads, Bridges, Sidewalks (Summer)  
 Snow Fence  
 Common Schools  
 Insurance of School Buildings  
 High School  
 Schoolhouse Repair  
 Salary of Superintendent  
 Interest on Common School Fund  
 Support of Poor, Veterans Aid, Aid Dependent  
 Children  
 Cutting Bushes on State, State Aid and Third Class  
 Highways  
 Memorial Day  
 Care of Cemeteries  
 Contingent Account  
 Note on School Building (Grammar)  
 Street Lights  
 Aid to Dependent Children (Mothers' Aid)  
 Simpson Memorial Library  
 Removal of Snow  
 Interest on Notes and Temporary Loan  
 Carmel School District

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand, two hundred twenty-five dollars, (\$1,225.00) the amount due for the bonded indebtedness of the town, including interest for the current year.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate to the Carmel School District the sum of one thousand, five hundred ninety dollars and sixty-two cents, (\$1,590.62) the amount due for School District Bond and interest for the year 1944-45; also the sum of eight hundred fifty (\$850.00) for necessary repairs and insurance.

Art. 15. To elect a Collector of Taxes and fix his compensation.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate for state aid construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930 or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise money, and what sum, for the maintenance of State and State Aid highways within the limits of said town under Sections 8 and 17, Chapter 25 of Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for special resolve maintenance, under Chapter 124, Public Laws 1927.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$532.00 for the maintenance of third class roads, in order for the town to be entitled to third class apportionment under the provisions of the amendments of Section 46 of Chapter 175, Public Laws of 1933.

Art. 20. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$90.00 for public health nursing in Carmel. Said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local service.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to cooperate with the Maine Forest Service and the Federal Government in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust in accordance with Revised Statutes, Chapter 11, Sections 62, 63, 64.

Art. 22. To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) in trust for perpetual care of Isaac Garcelon lot in Highland Cemetery.

Art. 24. To see what wages the town will vote to pay for trucks, teams, and men working for the town, the coming year.

Art. 25. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to deduct from the wages of all town employees a percentage of the same, to be applied on taxes, and fix the rate.

Art. 26. To see what action the town will take about the closing of Hinkley Hill and Partridge Schools.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen, on behalf of the town, to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on payment of cash and to execute quit claim

deeds for such property, or to take any other legal action necessary to acquire possession of and sell said property.

Art. 28. To see if the town, for the purpose of procuring a temporary loan or loans to and for the use of said Town in conducting its municipal business in the current municipal year of 1944 and in anticipation of and to be paid out of the taxes of the current municipal year of 1944, will authorize and direct the Town Treasurer, subject to the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow from time to time, during said municipal year, a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate, the sum of four thousand dollars, (\$4,000.00) and to make, execute and deliver the negotiable note or notes of the Town therefor, payable within said current municipal year and upon such terms as shall be satisfactory to said Town Treasurer and Selectmen, any debt or debts incurred hereunder to be paid out of money raised by taxation during the present municipal year.

Art. 29. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the Town Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon of the day of said meeting.

*To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Carmel:*

I herewith submit the annual report of the schools of Carmel.

The following table gives the teachers and fall term enrollment of the schools:

The teacher shortage in Maine as well as in other states is acute. At the half year, there are still schools which remain closed for lack of a teacher. Therefore, Carmel is indeed fortunate to have retained the services of the trained, experienced teachers listed above. The salaries they receive are very moderate and in common with others, they have to pay increased taxes and cost of living. I not only urge your continued support and cooperation for your teachers, but also hope sincerely that you will see the need for salary increases.

## TEXTBOOKS

The principal expenditures to be made this year should be for the improvement and enlargement of classroom libraries, science material, and changes in arithmetics for grades five to eight, inclusive.

## CONVEYANCE

It has not been easy to provide adequate conveyance under war-time conditions and restrictions. We appreciate the attitude nearly all of the parents have taken toward inconveniences. There is not much doubt that, when it is possible, the town should consider buying school busses to cover all routes.

## REPAIRS

The principal repairs were made at the grammar school where new grates were installed, and inside painting and varnishing completed.

The Horseback school toilets need extensive repairs and new shades must be bought for this building. These shades are extra large and at an estimate, the cost would be forty dollars.

## HIGH SCHOOL

For the report of the high school, I refer you to Principal Dingley's account. Mr. Dingley, Mrs. Dingley, and Miss Drew deserve much credit for the excellent work of this school.

## PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

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The enrollment of Carmel High School at the beginning of the school year was fifty-five students. This is smaller than usual, due to war conditions. All underclassmen returned to school except those who moved out of town, or were taken into the armed services.

The student body includes fifteen tuition students, which is about 27% of the enrollment. We could enroll several more out-of-town students if places could be found where they could work their board.

The high school continues to offer three courses of study: commercial, general and college courses. Work in mathematics has been increased, in line with war demands. Graduates in the future will have a good grounding in algebra, and an opportunity of securing at least three years of advanced mathematics. Very few schools in the State offer more than this.

The grammar grades are now in the building with the high school, and the two groups have worked together pleasantly and efficiently. I would strongly recommend that all the seventh and eighth grades be grouped another year into a junior high school.

We are gradually accumulating proper laboratory equipment for physics and chemistry. I would advise some equipment for general science and biology courses. With so many people going into nursing and similar work, we should at least have one good microscope, and proper related equipment. A reasonable expenditure along these lines would give us a well balanced four years of science.

Library facilities are slowly improving, but I feel that it would be good economy to increase expenditures in this department. Good books are a necessity in any good school. The world changes so rapidly in these days that books are soon out of date. We have added to our library by borrowing from the State Library, but this does not fill all our needs.

The general morale of the school is good, and work has gone forward harmoniously. Attendance has been very good, considering the unusual labor shortage. The high school operated on a one-session schedule during a part of the fall term, and the students put in nearly 3000 hours working on farms and in the woods. If there is a demand for their help again in the last part of the spring term, they will be glad to respond again.

The townspeople have given the school very fine support in the magazine drive, the senior play, and various school functions. The students in general appreciate the educational opportunities you have given them, and as a whole they are making satisfactory use of them.
