TOWN WARRANT

Penobscot, ss.

State of Maine

To Frank Palmer, Constable of Carmel, in said County:

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Carmel, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said town on Monday, March 5, A. D. 1945, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following article to wit:

✓ Art. 1. To elect a moderator to preside at said meeting.

✓ Art. 2. To elect a town clerk.

✓ Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the reports of the municipal officers as printed.

✓ Art. 4. To fix the compensation of our several officers. First selectman; second selectman; third selectman; assessors; overseers of the poor; road commissioner; superintending school committee; town treasurer; fire warden, and raise money for the same.

✓ Art. 5. To elect three or more selectmen, assessors, and overseers of the poor.

✓ Art. 6. To elect a town treasurer.

✓ Art. 7. To elect one or more members of the superintending school committee.

Art. 8. To see if the town will elect a road commissioner or authorize the selectmen to act as road commissioners.

Art. 9. To elect a road commissioner if the town so votes in the preceding article.

Art. 10. To elect a fire warden; sexton; surveyors of wood, bark and lumber; fence viewers; tramp constable, excise tax collector, and town agent.

Art. 11. To elect one or more town constables.

Art. 12. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, for the following purposes:

- ✓ Roads, Bridges, Sidewalks (Summer)
- ✓ Snow Fence
- ✓ Common Schools
- ✓ Insurance of School Buildings
- ✓ High School
- ✓ Schoolhouse Repair
- ✓ Salary of Superintendent
- ✓ Interest of Common School Fund
- ✓ Support of Poor, Veterans Aid
- ✓ Cutting Bushes on State, State Aid and Third Class Highways
- ✓ Memorial Day
- ✓ Care of Cemeteries
- ✓ Contingent Account
- Street Lights
- Aid to Dependent Children (Mothers' Aid)
- Simpson Memorial Library
- Removal of Snow
- Interest on Notes and Temporary Loan
- Carmel School District

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand one hundred and eighty dollars (\$1,180.00) the amount due for the bonded indebtedness of the town, including interest for the current year.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate to the Carmel School District the sum of one thousand five hundred sixty-four dollars and thirty-seven cents (\$1,564.37), the amount due for School District Bond and interest for the year 1945-46; also the sum of two hundred seventy-seven dollars and fifty-eight cents for insurance.

Art. 15. To see what sum the town will raise for grading and necessary repairs of the New High School.

Art. 16. To elect a Collector of Taxes and fix his compensation.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate for state aid construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways, and bridge) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930 or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229 Public Laws of 1937.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise money and what sum for the maintenance of State and State Aid highways within the limits of said town under Sections 8 and 17, Chapter 25 of Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for special resolve maintenance, under Chapter 124, Public Laws 1927.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred thirty-two dollars (\$532.00) for the maintenance of third class roads, in order for the town to be entitled to third class apportionment under the provisions of the amendments of Section 46 of Chapter 175, Public Laws of 1933.

Art. 21. To see if the town will raise and appropriate ninety dollars (\$90.00) for public health nursing in Carmel. Said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local service.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) to cooperate with the Maine Frest Service and the Federal Government in the control of White Pine Blister Rust in accordance with Revised Statutes, Chapter 11, Sections 62, 63, 64.

Art. 23. To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.

Art. 24. To see what wages the town will vote to pay for trucks, teams, and men working for the town, the coming year.

Art. 25. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to deduct from the wages of all town employees a percentage of the same, to be applied on taxes, and fix the rate.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for surfacing the Murray Road.

Art. 27. To see what action the town will take in regards to plowing snow; buying equipment; giving selectmen authority to give snow-removal contracts over a period of years.

Art. 28. To see if the town will purchase Henry Swett's snow-plow and raise money for same.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to accept and receive under the provisions of the law, the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) from the estate of Wilford S. Pike for the perpetual care of the Nathan Pike lot in North Carmel Cemetery.

Art. 30. To see what action the town will take in regards to the old high school building.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to elect two officers for the Carmel School District.

Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to close indefinitely Hinkley Hill and Partridge Schools, and also to have the Horseback School remain closed.

Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to abate the 1944 tax of Edson Smith for Buildings Burned.

Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen on behalf of the town, to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on payment of cash and to execute quit claim deeds for such property, or to take any other legal action necessary to acquire possession of and sell said property.

Art. 35. To see if the town, for the purpose of procuring a temporary loan or loans to and for the use of said town in conducting its municipal business in the current

municipal year of 1944 and in anticipation of and to be paid out of the taxes of the current municipal year of 1945, will authorize and direct the Town Treasurer, subject to approval of the Selectmen, to borrow from time to time, during said municipal year, a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate, the sum of four thousand dollars, (\$4,000.00) and to make, execute and deliver the negotiable note or notes of the Town therefor, payable within said current municipal year and upon such terms as shall be satisfactory to said Town Treasurer and Selectmen, any debt or debts incurred hereunder to be paid out of money raised by taxation during the present municipal year.

Art. 36. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the Town Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon of the day of said meeting.

REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

The effectiveness of a community health service depends to a large extent on the interest in and the understanding of the public health program by all citizens of the community. It is essential that they appreciate the value of that service. From a personal standpoint they should be interested in the program because the health of every citizen in the community affects the health of other citizens and because the cost of service is directly or indirectly borne by the individual taxpayers.

Visits were made to the expectant mother for the purpose of helping her secure necessary equipment for confinement, a diet suitable for the growth and development of the baby and to help carry out doctor's orders. Medical attention has been urged early in pregnancy. This is the period when care to the mother and to the baby to be born is most beneficial. Follow-up visits were made after the baby was born to emphasize the importance to the mother of proper rest, diet and a return visit to the doctor.

Several visits were made to infants in your community to help mothers set up daily routine for feeding and care of the baby. Importance of a visit to the doctor has been stressed. Mothers were helped in introducing new foods into the baby's diet to promote growth. Special emphasis was given the prevention of communicable diseases at an early age.

Health supervision visits were made to several pre-school children in order to help with correction of defects. It is advisable that these be corrected before they enter school. It is our aim to send a healthier child to school.

Many conferences were held with the teachers regarding health problems. Improvement in the health of the children today as compared to a few years ago is noticeable. Many

health problems have been mastered. Home visits were made to parents of school children in order to explain the need of dental, vision and hearing corrections and to advise on control of communicable diseases. In March sixty-three school children were vaccinated against small-pox. Hot lunches would be a benefit to those children who are unable to go home at noon. This project has already been discussed with interested persons.

Whenever necessary children have been referred to pediatric and crippled children's clinics sponsored by the State Bureau of Health where attention by specialists is available for diagnosis and recommendation.

Necessary follow-up on contacts of persons with tuberculosis have been made. Visits to patients who are now arrested were made for the purpose of advising them to return for x-rays and examinations.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Carmel:

I herewith submit the annual report of the schools of Carmel.

TEACHERS

High School: George Bell (fall term), Joseph Devitt, principal, Science and Math. Miss Katie A. Moore, English, Latin, and French. Miss Barbara J. Drew, Commercial subjects.

The shortage of well-trained, experienced teachers in Maine is acute. The town of Carmel has been able to secure the services of the excellent staff of teachers named above. The amount of money appropriated last March with

the increased State Aid allowed some small increases in salaries. Other cities and towns have also increased salaries, and if we wish to keep our teachers, we must expect to pay an adequate, living wage. I strongly urge your continued active support and cooperation for your teachers.

TEXTBOOKS

New arithmetic texts were furnished for the elementary schools.

REPAIRS

The largest item in the repair account was for installing insulation at the grammar school building under direction of the Insoilheat Company. It is estimated that a very large saving in fuel can be thus effected.

HIGH SCHOOL

The high school has had a large number of tuition students this year, and a great deal of interest is shown in the school. Three courses are offered: general, college preparatory, and commercial. Having the seventh and eighth grades in the high school building stimulates interest on the part of this age group in the high school work.
