Important Notice To Taxpayers

All Taxpayers should read the following and comply with it. Section 36, Chapter 92, Revised Statutes of Maine, 1954.

Before making an assessment, the assessors shall give reasonable notice in writing to the inhabitants, by posting notification in writing in some public place in town, or shall notify them, in such other ways as the town at its annual meeting directs, to make and bring in to them true and perfect lists of their polls and all their estates, real and personal, not by law exempt from taxation, of which they were possessed on the first day of April of the same year. If any resident owner after being reasonably requested thereto by the assessors, does not bring in such list, he is barred of his right to make application to the assessors or the county commissioners for any abatement of his taxes, unless he offers such list with his application and satisfies them that he was unable to offer it at the time appointed. The request upon non-resident owners may be proved by a notice sent by mail directed to the last known address of the Taxpayer or given by any other method that brings notice to the Taxpayer.

Carmel Volunteer Fire Department

To the citizens of Carmel:

This has been the worst year in the history of Carmel for fires. We have been called out 34 times, 5 times to Etna, 3 times to Hermon, and 26 times at Carmel. We have had 8 major fires resulting in the loss of considerable taxable property.

Among the things of most importance accomplished during the year to improve the department are:

We have purchased 900 feet of new hose.

We have had installed a fire phone system called the Red Network, which is very helpful in getting the men out quickly to the fires.

All of our men are covered by an accident insurance policy.

We have purchased new Indian pump and small tools.

Many of our men attended a fire fighting course given by the State. We are presently attending a course in Forest Fire Fighting given by the State Forestry wardens.

The Ladies' Auxiliary has been of valuable assistance to the department, having contributed \$200.00 enabling us to purchase new helmets for the men.

I am happy to report that considerably more interest has been shown in the department and the meetings have been well attended. Remember this is your department and we would like to see more people taking an active part in it.

Report of Public Health Nurse

MAINE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND WELFARE

Division of Public Health Nursing, Bureau of Health

Annual Report of Public Health Nursing Services in the Town of Carmel for the Year 1959:

At the year's end it is again appropriate to give you an account of public health nursing services in your community for the year 1959.

The primary purpose of public health nursing is to provide nursing service to people at home, at school, at work, in clinics and health centers, so that individuals, families and the community as a whole will be helped to achieve and maintain optimum health. Public health nursing is one of the basic health services that contribute to a healthy and happy way of life.

The very important work of the Division of Public Health Nursing of the Maine Department of Health and Welfare is to provide public health nursing service to people in the rural areas and small towns of our State. These services include:

Health teaching of individuals and families in their homes for the promotion of health and correction of defects.

Teaching nursing care of the sick and rehabilitation of the handicapped in their own homes, with medical direction from the patient's physician.

Prevention and control of communicable diseases through immunization programs, detection and follow-up of tuberculosis and venereal diseases, and health education.

Maternal and child care, including school health services and child health conferences.

Follow-up home visiting to individuals and families under care of the various State clinics and services — crippled children, pediatric, mental retardation, cleft palate, adolescent, cardiac, tuberculosis — to help patients and families carry out the doctor's instructions for treatment.

Working closely with physicians, hospitals, and other health and social agencies in behalf of patients and families.

Working closely with the townspeople, individually and in groups, so that the people themselves will take responsibility for developing health programs to meet their local health needs.

Health is a priceless possession, defined by the World Health Organization as "a state of complete physical, mental, and social well-being and not merely the absence of disease or disability." It is wisely said that public health is people, who are so concerned with good health for themselves, their neighbors, and their community that they work for this priceless possession. This wise saying guides us well, for nowhere in our State do we have the number of public health nurses we need to give all the services we would like to give. It follows, then, that a successful public health nursing program does, and indeed should, depend largely upon the interest, support, and volunteer work of the local people, individually and through organized group effort. The public health nurse gives directly those services that require her special professional nursing skills and gives leadership and counsel to the townspeople in developing, cooperatively, the health programs most suitable for their own community.

Your public health nurse submits the following summary of public health nursing services in your community for the year 1959:

Three Child Health Conferences were held in your town this fall. These were very successful in that 75 children received physical examinations, 55 children received diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis vaccine, 9 children received smallpox vaccine, and 36 children received complete polio immunizations.

Plans are made to give polio vaccine to the school children in January 1960.

Again a plea is made for a much needed Health Council in your town. Although there has been a good committee participation in the past, many more projects could be developed through a Health Council.

With sincerity many thanks are given to those who have assisted me in various projects this past year.

This year we have made available a nice classroom in the basement of the Grammar School. While this incurred considerable expense, a great deal of labor and materials was donated by townspeople. This help was greatly appreciated as it cut the cost considerably.

With a steady increase in enrollment figures, it now looks like an additional teacher, as well as another room, may be necessary in September. Our proposed budget includes funds for the teacher's salary, as well as heat and light for this proposed room.

It is difficult to make an intelligent recommendation for new construction in view of the possibility of joining an Administrative School District sometime in the future.

Our heating facilities at the Grammar School will not allow for the addition of even one more room. We have been advised that \$4,000.00 will be needed to make necessary repairs to the foundation of the High School. A like amount has been recommended for the heating system in this building.

It would be nice if we could have 2 or 3 new classrooms as well as a gymnasium. All things considered at this time, I would recommend the construction of a small gymnasium, all purpose room or auditorium - call it what you will. What I have in mind would fill the needs of the High School for physical education and assembly room purposes. It, of course, would serve also as a public

meeting place for community activities. This building could be utilized temporarily to house an additional classroom unit, if necessary.

A word of explanation is in order on 2 of the Expenditure items —

1. Conveyance — includes \$10,000.00 borrowed for the purchase of 2 new buses. Recommended appropriations for Common Schools included the annual payment of \$2,000.00 plus interest of \$400.00 on this loan.

2. School Lunch — Since the beginning of school in September, we have been paying the school lunch cook's salary by school warrant and the lunch program has returned the estimated town share to the Town Treasurer. Increased subsidy next year will be quite a help to the lunch program.

While our recommendations are considerably greater than a year ago, they reflect only minimum needs in a growing school program. It should be kept in mind that the more we spend, the nearer we come to the Foundation Program, which means more state subsidy the following year.

Carmel High School

FEBRUARY 10, 1960

During the past year we have seen the largest graduating class in the history of Carmel High School receive their diplomas. From these twenty-two graduates, four are attending colleges, four are in service and fourteen are employed in various other occupations.

Since September of 1959, we have initiated work in a small library. Thus far we have been able to catalog the books we now have. This is being done by student librarians.

We feel that our curriculum is still somewhat weak in the vocational and general fields. The addition of shop, home-economics, and allied subjects could strengthen these programs considerably.

The 99th legislature revised the laws regulating the issuance of drivers' licenses. This law prohibits any person from obtaining a license under the age of 17 unless he has successfully passed a Driver Education Course. The law becomes effective September 1960. We feel that Driver Education and several other courses should be added to the high school curriculum to better serve the needs of our students.

School activities have not increased markedly in number during the past year. School functions have been well attended and we are grateful to the citizens of Carmel for their support, criticism, and interest in school activities.

(Budget Committee recommends bank loan of \$8,000., payable on a 4 year basis for Art. 23 and Art. 24.)

Art. 24. To see if the inhabitants of the town will vote to raise a sum of money, and if so, how much, and appropriate the same for the purpose of improving the High School Heating System, or act on anything relating thereto.

Art. 25. To see what action the Town will vote to take on new school construction.

Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Superintending School Committee to pay tuition to another secondary school if in their opinion a Carmel student is deserving and needs courses not offered in our High School.

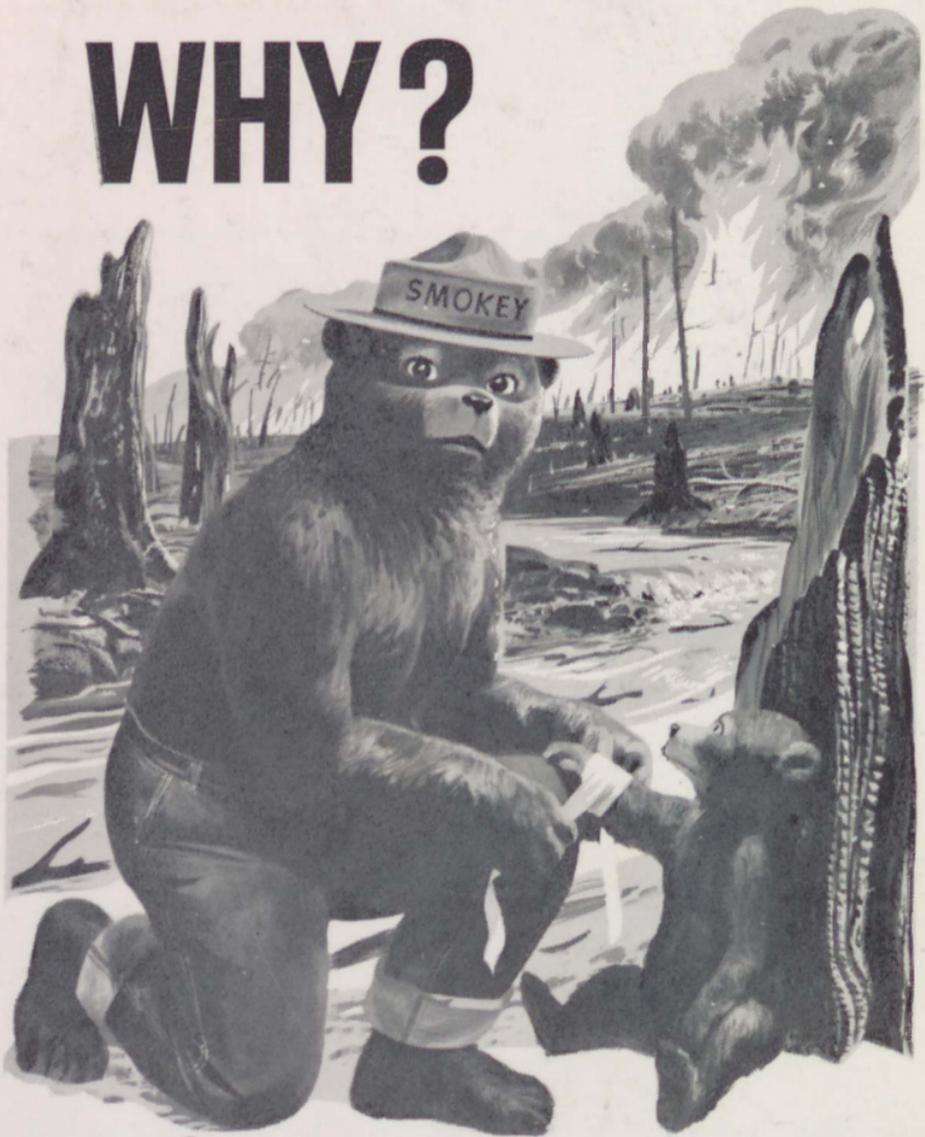
