Letter of Transmittal

To the Selectmen and Citizens of Carmel:

It gives me great pleasure to present to you the annual report of the activities of the various town departments during the 1963 fiscal year. In my opinion no report of this nature is complete without weighing the facts presented and looking to the future. Therefore I have included in the latter part of this letter several comments in an effort to consider where we are going and what the future holds for our community.

Several major construction projects have been completed during the eleven month period we are considering. Since these projects have been the results of efforts from different departments, they should be considered separately. Let us examine our Education Program first.

Since the Educational Program in Carmel is composed of a School Administrative District, basically the town's relation to the school is that of a financial nature. We also elect representatives to the School Board. A substantial portion of the funds raised through taxation are turned over to the School District. With these funds the District has constructed a new and modern plant with facilities adequate to provide for future enrollment. This represents a major improvement over our previous facilities.

The Department of Public Works has provided several improvements in the community. Major construction took place on the Fuller Road, where four tenths of a mile was rebuilt, the Five Road, where three tenths of a mile was rebuilt and surfaced, the Irish Road, where six tenths of a mile was rebuilt, and the Pomeroy Road, which was completely resurfaced. State and Federal funds have

provided us with 6.3 miles of interstate highway connecting our community with Boston markets. This Highway is a major asset to Carmel.

1963 proved to be a major year in the development of Carmel. We were the first town in the State of Maine to offer free measles vaccine at a public clinic. Our Fire Department purchased a new International Tank Truck during March of the year. A Zoning ordinance was accepted by the town. The Selectmen have contracted with the Sewall Corporation for Property Maps of the Community which will facilitate assessment, and provide a complete Municipal Inventory. A labor survey has been taken which will provide us with valuable information with which to attract industry and allow for development.

Though our progress has been great, our expenditures have been low. Of the \$25,170.00 appropriated at the March Town Meeting, over \$6,000 was not spent. This money has been transferred to Surplus, and will reduce the necessity of borrowing in anticipation of taxes. Currently our surplus account has a balance of over \$13,000. On the surface it would appear that this money should be spent to reduce the tax load, but it should be pointed out that the town has over \$33,200.00 in taxes which have not been paid. It becomes apparent that we still must borrow over \$20,000.00 to meet our obligation. Were the surplus fund to be decreased by \$3,000.00 we would have to borrow \$3,000.00 more to meet our obligations. Therefore, I strongly recommend that this account be allowed to accumulate, rather than be depleted. This is one of the few ways that a community can strengthen its financial base.

As this report has shown, the Town has made much progress in 1963. If our current level of growth and development can be maintained, Carmel will soon be a major community in Penobscot County. Continued growth, however, is contingent upon several factors.

Our Community is suffering from a severe lack of in-

dustrial development. The State and Federal governments have provided us with a major asset with which to attract new industry, an interstate highway. But we cannot be content to wait for an industry to locate here. We have to make a sincere effort to attract industrial growth. Without needed funds and public enthusiasm, any efforts of a small group will be in vain.

The prospect of a revaluation of the taxable property in Carmel may be appealing to many of the citizens. Estimates for a revaluation have been approximately \$7,500.00. It is essential that we give serious consideration to a major review of the inequalities that now exist in the valuations placed upon our taxable property. Some taxpayers are now taxed unduly heavy while others are permitted to escape with only a relatively small charge. This condition not only disrupts harmonious relations between the town and its taxpayers, but also presents a serious financial problem. The Selectmen have laid the groundwork for a revaluation program by purchasing property maps. This was a wise investment. We should make every effort financially possible to complete our taxing program by providing funds for a revaluation.

Finally, of major concern to the citizens of Carmel is the Town Hall question. An article appears in this warrant to tear down the present town hall and construct a small office in its place. The cost of such a program would be borne over a six year period; each year the town would repay approximately \$2,080.00, including interest. This is a small amount, and is well worth the expenditure. Since the present building has become uninsurable, it would be extremely expensive to repair it. Were it to be repaired, the cost would go well over the proposed expenditure for a new building, and we would still have an outdated building. In any event, we must decide what is to be done about the Town Hall, and funds must be raised immediately.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank those who

have helped me during the 1963 year. The Selectmen, Assessors, various committee members, and those who helped make our labor survey a success. Most of all I wish to thank Mr. Harvey DeVane, whose able administration of this community prior to my employment has left this office on an extremely solid footing. Perhaps the citizens of this community will never know or appreciate the work he has done. Since I have had the privilege of being his successor in Carmel I realize that he has been another major asset to our community. Let us look forward to another year as profitable as 1963.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS

ESTATE DISTRIBUTED

When the estate of persons deceased have been distributed during the past year, or have changed hands from any cause, the Executor, Administrator, or other interested persons are hereby warned to give notice of such change, and in default of such notice will be held under law to pay the tax assessed although such estate has been wholly distributed and paid over.

RESIDENT OWNERS

All inhabitants of the Town of Carmel, Maine, and all Administrators, Executors, Trustees, etc., of all estates taxable in said town of such persons are hereby notified to MAKE AND BRING IN TO THE ASSESSORS TRUE AND PERFECT LISTS OF THEIR POLLS AND ALL THEIR ESTATES, REAL AND PERSONAL, not by law exempt from taxation, of which they were possessed on the first day of April 1964 and be prepared to make oath to the truth of the same and to answer all proper inquiries in writing as to the nature, situation, and value of their property liable to be taxed.

PERSONS DOOMED

Any resident owner who neglects to comply with this notice is hereby barred of his right to make application to the Assessors or the County Commissioners, for any abatement of his taxes, unless he offers such list with his application and satisfies them that he was unable to offer it at the time appointed.

NOTICE TO VETERANS DESIRING EXEMPTIONS

No exemptions on polls and estates shall be allowed in favor of any person who is not a legal resident of the State of Maine; and provided that any male or female veteran, or blind person, who desires to secure exemption shall, on or before the first day of April, notify in writing the assessors where he or she resides, and furnish proof of entitlement, and thereafter said assessors shall grant such exemption while so qualified. (Chap. 91-A Revised Statutes)

Note: The polls and estates of all persons who by reasons of infirmity or poverty are in the judgment of the assessors unable to contribute toward the public charges are exempt. (Chap. 91-A, Revised Statutes)

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Herewith is presented the second annual report of the Superintendent of School Administrative District No. 23. Actually this has been our first full 12-month year of operation. This year has also been involved with major building program.

Operation

Our total educational program is at an all time high right now. The following facts are quite significant—

1. We now have all pupils grades 6, 7, & 8 profiting from a real physical education program in a nice modern plant.
2. Many of our young people are doing outstanding work in instrumental music. Mr. Zeigler's work with these young people is a source of pride to everyone.
3. Girls physical education is now available at Hermon H. S.
4. Other improvements at Hermon H. S. include—
 - a. the addition to the gymnasium provides shower and locker facilities for both boys and girls.
 - b. this addition is also making available three large rooms. One of these rooms is for the band. The second is for classes in physical education. The third is a spare.
 - c. over \$3,000.00 has been spent in improvements to the science laboratory.
 - d. two additional teachers were hired this year making possible more courses of study in our program.
5. The coordinator's time for supervision has been cut by one half this year. This was done to keep costs down. Sawin Millett is teaching half time at the Jr. High Building.

New Building

Last year at this time we had cost estimates for a 6-room building plus gymnasium etc. of \$188,000.00. It was our feeling that we should have 8 rooms if possible. When you realize that our bond-issue was only \$148,000.00 it is hard to believe that we could possibly realize our goal of an 8-room building.

It was the decision of your directors that we have plans approved for an 8-room building and to construct the building with a building committee in charge. Since the building was not put out to bid by contractors there is no way of knowing what the lowest bid might have been. However, it seems safe to say that on a contract basis the present building would have cost well over \$200,000.00.

By having the building in operation by November 1, we were able to apply for building aid. This aid was of course based on 3 sources of funds—1. appropriation for equipment, 2. temporary loan thru our operation account and 3. an estimate of grading and seeding grounds (this work is yet to be done.)

To Keep the Records Straight

Your directors serving as a building committee met on the average of twice a week—March to October. They have taken hours and hours of time from their families in order to make possible this new building at less cost. For this time they have received no financial remuneration whatsoever.

Tuition charges at Herman H.S. for the year ended June, 63 were \$606.00 per pupil. This was the charge to all non-resident pupils attending Hermon High School. The Hermon High School Committee by terms of our contract had no choice in this.

The Maine statutes require that the costs for a given year must be divided by the average daily membership of the previous year to determine per pupil cost. An estimate of the charge for the school year ending June, 64, is \$425.00.

The Hermon S. S. Com. fully realizes that spending more money for additional services would result in a higher tuition rate the following year. Their policy is to add new services gradually with an attempt to keep costs within the towns ability to pay taxes.

Budget

The proposed budget for next year is somewhat larger than for the year just ended. This is to be expected with the additional costs of operating and paying for a new school plant.

There are 2 reasons why the assessments to the towns will be less for next year.

1. Lower tuition rate at Hermon.
2. Increased subsidy for operation.

Conclusion

It is my firm conviction that anyone who knows the facts would have to agree with me that—our program of education is improving and that we have reason to take pride in what we have.

Carmel Volunteer Fire Department

To the Citizens of Carmel

During 1963 this Department was called upon to fight a total of thirty nine fires. Of this number, seven were chimney fires, four were grass fires, four were house fires and twenty four were of miscellaneous nature. The locations of these fires were as follows: thirty one in Carmel, four in Etna, two in Hermon, one in Levant, and one in Newburg.

The new International pumper was delivered in April. It has an 800 gallon tank and has a pumping capacity of 500 gallons per minute. This is a practical and efficient piece of equipment, which citizens of the town can be very proud of.

The tank truck has had a much needed general mechanical overhaul. New rear tires and a large revolving red light have been installed on it.

The policy of having a man stay in the fire house during the winter months in the evening has paid off. Two fires in homes were quickly brought under control

with a minimum of damage. Had either of these fires had ten minutes more of a start, it is doubtful if the house could have been saved.

The major aim for 1964 is to bring the department up to a Class E rating as prescribed by the New England Fire Insurance Rating Association. This rating will result in considerable saving to many citizens of the town. To obtain this rating, it will mean some structural changes in the fire house and the purchase of some new equipment. This rating, as it affects you and its cost will be fully explained at town meeting.

I am happy to report that our meetings have been well attended and considerable interest is shown in the department. Any citizen of town is welcome at our meetings. This is your department. Become an active part of it.

Once again I wish to thank the men who operate the department and the townspeople who support us through the year.

Report of the Zoning Inspector

Since the ratification of the Zoning Ordinance, there have been eleven applications filed with this Department. Of these, nine were approved and two were denied. The breakdown appears below.

The process of the Ordinance enforcement requires that in the event of a known infraction, the violator must be notified by mail, and given a ten day period to satisfy the inspector that the violation has been corrected. In the event that this is not done, the inspector must then have a warrant sworn against the violator and the state courts take over the enforcement. Three letters of this nature were sent during the year, resulting in an abatement of the violation in two cases. The third case has been taken to the Board of Appeals and is pending a decision from that body. Also before the Board of Appeals is one case which a building permit has been denied.
